Miramichi SPCA Needs Community Support

The Miramichi SPCA is in need of community support in order to keep their doors open and continue operating their No Kill shelter. The shelter's operating budget is about \$10,000 a month. Donations currently only cover about a quarter of their regular operating costs. At the moment the shelter is at maximum capacity for cats and dogs. If donations don't go up, permanent closure is a very real possibility.

The Miramichi SPCA is a private, independent, not-for-profit organization that is fully-funded by donations from people like you. Their only government support is from the city's sale of dog tags, which represents about 2% of their annual operating budget. Federally and Provincially, they receive nothing. They rely on fees from memberships, fees for services, individual and corporate donations, special events, and merchandise sales.

There are many ways you can help financially and through other donations such as pet food, toys, flea treatments and more. Check the Wish List Page on their website for a list of current needs. You can make a one time monetary donation or set up regular monthly payments online or through the mail. You can also donate directly to the Pet Love and Care Vet Clinic to help cover their monthly vet bills or return your recyclable bottles to Hebert's on Wellington Street and ask them to donate your refund to the SPCA. Donation Boxes are also located in many local businesses. No







Words on Water welcomes Authors Josh O'Kane & Zev Bagel

Lovers of words and music will not want to miss Words on Water's next event the at Rodd Miramichi River Hotel on Tuesday August 9th. Two new books by New Brunswick authors, Josh O'Kane and Zev Bagel, will be featured along with a live musical

performance and an Open Mic reading. Doors will open at 6:30 with readings getting under way promptly at 7 pm. Admission is free. Anyone planning to participate in the Open Mic should come prepared with a reading of no more than four minutes.

Josh O'Kane's first book, Nowhere with You: The East Coast Anthems of Joel Plaskett, The Emergency and Thrush Hermit, was published this spring by ECW Press. Josh is a staff reporter with the Globe and Mail, who grew up in Saint John and spent every summer on the Miramichi. Both his parents are from Chatham. He has previously written for the Telegraph-Journal, Toronto Star, Exclaim!, and New Brunswick's Here Magazine. For better or for worse, like thousands of Maritimers before him, he now lives in Toronto.

A celebration of a beloved Canadian icon, featuring dozens of original interviews and exclusive photos Josh says, "It's a book about someone who was able to stay, written by someone who had to move away."

Canada's east coast has never been much of a pop-culture

mecca. Most musicians from the region who've ever made it big moved away. But armed with a stubborn streak and a knack for great songwriting, Plaskett has kept Halifax as his home, building both a career and a music community there. Along the way, he's earned great respect: when he plays shows in Alberta, east-coast expats literally thank him for staying home.

Nowhere with You is the study of how he pulled this off, from the origins of Canada's east-coast exodus to Plaskett's anointment as "Halifax's Rick Rubin." It's about doing what you want, where you want, no matter how much work it takes.

"A lovely book. Worthy of the CanRock literary canon and then some," says Dave Bidini, member of the Rheostatics and author of *On a Cold Road and Writing Gordon Lightfoot*.

Zev Bagel has lived in the UK, France and Canada. He is President of the Writers' Federation of New Brunswick and has had 17 books of non-fiction published. *Bernie Waxman & the Whistling Kettle* is his first novel, an e-Book which was published by MuseItUp in June. Zev lives in Shediac, where he moved from Calgary seven years ago.

The tagline for Zev's book reads: *Bernie Waxman's* grandfather invented the whistling kettle, and a fine mess that got the family into!

"In *Bernie Waxman*, we follow the exploits of a fellow whose grandfather invented the whistling tea kettle. Zev writes with warmth, truth, and in a most entertaining style. His publisher, MuseItUp has produced a number of wellwritten novels, and you can count *Bernie Waxman* among them. Five stars; an easy five stars," says Chuck Bowie, author.



Celebrating our Scottish Heritage

The Miramichi Scottish Festival will run from August 19th to the 21st. This is a special year for Scottish celebrations since 2016 marks the 250th anniversary of the arrival of William Davidson's settlers on the Miramichi. Davidson, from Fochabers in Scotland, received the Miramichi 100,000 acre land grant in 1765.

Friday night, at the Riverside Entertainment Centre, the Highland Society will hold its annual tartan banquet and awards night where the William Davidson Medal for Merit will be presented. Entertainment will feature the Fochabers Fiddlers, a group of accomplished young musicians from Davidson's hometown in Scotland who have played venues across Europe and North America. They were with us last year, and have just recently played at Royal Albert Hall in London.

Saturday afternoon, August 20th, on Waterford Green in the Historic Chatham Downtown Business District an extravaganza of Scottish music, dance and pipes will be held,

featuring Fochabers Fiddlers, Mason's Tender, Miramichi Fiddlers, and a wealth of great talent.

Sunday morning, August 21st, the memorial church service and Kirk'n of the Tartan will be held at St. Andrew's United Church, 188 Wellington Street, Chatham, followed by the laying of the wreath at the Scottish monument and a reception in the church centre.

Sunday afternoon, August 21st, the celebration shifts to MacDonald Farm Heritage Site in Bartibog Bridge, an amazing 200 year old working farm managed on behalf of the Province by the Miramichi Highland Society. Events will be centred on the family, with horse and waggon rides, guided tours of the stone



We encourage you to also visit Wilson's Point which is open daily in August from 10 am to 5 pm. This is the site of an Early Scottish Settlement and cemetery where many of the earliest Miramichi settlers are buried including William Davidson. The Interpretive Centre built in 2004-05 is a model of the first Presbyterian Church, St. James, built at Wilson's Point in 1791. 

Blackville was long settled before it received its name. It was believed to be settled right after Northumberland County was established and at the same time New Brunswick was separated from Nova Scotia in 1784. Many Loyalists, dissatisfied with their land grants, moved from the Saint John and Nashwaak Rivers in 1785-1787.

The first to come was Alexander Underwood, a sea captain of Yorkshire, England who took part in the Revolutionary War. After the war was over, Captain Underwood was trekking his way through the wilds of New Brunswick by way of the Miramichi with every intention of returning to his native land, when by chance he met a fair lady, by the name of Nancy McGraw, fell in love, married and settled in Blackville.

The first doctor in Blackville was an English Army doctor by the name of William Idear. In the late 1700's, he Above: Blackville circa 1890.

Blackville's main industry for over 150 years was lumbering. Two Scotsman, Doak and Alexander MacLaggan arrived in Blackville and built a sawmill in 1820. It was located on the north side of the Bartholomew River, now the site of the Blackville Municipal Park. In the 1840's, across from the sawmill on the opposite side of the river, a water driven Grist Mill opened and was operated by an Englishman named Henry Steele. Farmers would plant their own wheat and have it ground into flour at the mill. The Grist Mill closed in 1902. One of the mill's original grinding stones currently resides in the Blackville Park.

In 1893, Alexander Gibson took over the sawmill and also built a steam mill. Archibald Alcorn, Sr., was the Gibson Mill's first engineer. In 1915, Gibson sold out to the Nashwaak Pulp & Paper Company Ltd., and the mill operated until 1931 when it was destroyed by fire. A few

was given a grant of 125 for his services acres rendered in the British army. The doctor settled on a small island which is now known as "Doctor's Island". Dr. Idear made his own medicines from the many wild herbs that he grew on the island. In the mid to late 1900's a botanist visited the island and found at least 170 different kinds of herbs growing there.

people in the woods. Poor lumber markets caused a shutdown in February of 1977. The mill later reopened as Blackville Lumber and operated until 2007.

The Parish of Blackville was established in 1830 and was named after the Honourable William Black, administrator for the Government of New Brunswick. Colonel Black was commander-in-chief of New Brunswick from 1829-1831.

In 1866, Blackville was a lumbering and farming settlement with about 20 families. In 1871 it had a population of 450. By 1898, Blackville was a station on the Canada Eastern Railway and a junction of the Intercolonial Railway with one post office, five stores, two hotels, two sawmills, one woodworking factory, two churches and a population of 600, and included the settlements of Underhill, Breadalbane and The Forks.


On September 15, 1936, the Blackville Credit Union received its charter and became the first organization of its kind in New Brunswick under the direction of Father AA McKinnon. It officially opened for business on September 30, 1936.

Blackville was incorporated as a village in 1966, annexing the neighbouring communities of Underhill and Breadalbane in the process.



Visiting the Miramichi History Museum

Nestled in Miramichi, at 182 Wellington Street, is the home of the Miramichi History Museum. I recently had the privilege of interviewing Shaun O'Reilly, President of the Miramichi Natural History Association, which operates the Miramichi History Museum. Mr. O'Reilly who has been president for 17 years, was generous enough to share his knowledge of the abundant displays showcased at the Museum.

AM: How long has the Miramichi History Museum been established?

SO: The Museum has been established since 1897. It was cofounded by Doctors, James M Baxter and Philip Cox. Throughout the years, the Museum has had several locations.

AM: What significance does the Museum have to the Miramichi area?

SO: It is the only institution preserving the artifacts and history of the Miramichi, for future generations to enjoy and for research purposes. The museum is a tremendous resource to writers and individuals looking to document the History of Miramichi.

AM: A few years ago the Museum moved to a more modern location. What was the transition like?

SO: In 2006, we began to look for a new location. The old location was deemed condemned and engineers were brought in. A new building was designed and the Museum received land from the City of Miramichi. It did not

work out. The present location became available in 2012. The Museum approached the Chatham Masons and the Masons were tremendously generous in helping purchase the present building.

AM: Since your move to the new location, do you see more visitor interest?

SO: Yes, definitely.

AM: Out of the various artifacts and exhibits, is there one more intriguing than the others with visitors?

SO: For children, it is the birds, tarantula, crocodile and famous eight legged cat in the Natural History section. For adults, it is the Cunard Display, the ferries, Tommy the Moose and the assorted Native Canadian Display.

The Museum operates from the middle of June to early September and is open Monday to Saturday from 10 am to 5:30 pm. Admission is \$3 for anyone over the age of 12. The present location would not be possible without the assistance of the City of Miramichi, Miramichi Historical Society and the

Chatham Masons. Recently the Museum received a substantial grant from the then Minister of Tourism, Heritage and Culture, Bill Fraser, who has also visited the site. This funding will be used to renovate the Museum's basement. This project will be completed by August 2016 and will be used to display more artifacts and exhibits.


