Book Review: "Three Wrongs" by Chuck Bowie

New Brunswick author (born in Miramichi, now living in Fredericton) Chuck Bowie has written three books in his "Sean Donovan: Thief for Hire" series. Three Wrongs (Muse It Up, 2013) is the first instalment. The latest is Steal it All (2016). When I first found out about Sean's vocation as a thief, I thought about that 60's TV series "It Takes a Thief" starring Robert Wagner. I'm probably dating myself here. That show was about a playboy-type thief who stole to support his extravagant lifestyle, but was soon caught, and in exchange for his freedom, he was to steal for the US government.

Sean Donovan is a freelance thief, and he has been quite successful at it. With his IT security background and some shady friends, he manages to do very well.


However, he is getting close to the point where a conscience is starting to take seed. He questions how much longer he can go on in this line of work.

"When was that moment many years back, where it had occurred to him he could bypass the legal ways of working? How did he slip into a world that rewarded, richly, those who were skilled enough to separate people from their possessions?"

Nevertheless, he is on a contract job in Romania and must steal what he promised to steal. Retirement would have to wait for now.

One Thing Leads to Another ...

While in Romania, he manages to get entangled with some stolen passports (and some unsavoury characters) and witnesses the cold-blooded murder of a young Roma street urchin. While he successfully manages to steal the item he



set out to steal, the original passport thieves continue to track him. While in London, a famous actress wants a necklace stolen from her co-star (with whom Sean falls in love with, further complicating things) then in New York, he is hired to steal a cassette tape with a clandestinely recorded conversation between JFK and Castro that has worldaltering implications. Does that sound like enough action for one book? Through it all, Sean continues to question why he does what he does. It's not for the money any more, he has plenty of that. So he and his new-found love Nadia come up with the idea of reversing his last three thefts: "three wrongs can make a right."

Conclusion

I'll admit that the thriller-type genre isn't my first choice for reading, but I found *Three Wrongs* entertaining and fun to read. Sean has a conscience and is generally a nice guy. *Three Wrongs* is a great first novel, full of adventure and intrigue in locations such as Montreal, New York and Romania. Mr. Bowie assures me that Book #2 and #3 are even better than *Three Wrongs*, and that makes me want to read them as well.

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Five Common Mistakes

About Going to the Gym by Adam Hambrook

For most people new to working out who decide to join a gym, it can be a very intimidating and overwhelming change. If you are going to join a gym avoid these five common mistakes in order to maximize your results and make going to the gym part of your healthy lifestyle forever.

Mistake #1: Choosing the wrong gym

Yes, the fancy, new, state of the art gym with 10,000 pieces of equipment may seem like a great option but perhaps traditional weight training isn't the right fit for you. There are plenty of options including CrossFit, military-style boot camp classes or even yoga.

Mistake #2: Bad exercise technique

With bad technique, injury will often soon follow which can prevent you from exercising. For those that are new to exercise, getting a good personal trainer with not only credentials and certifications but also experience is highly recommended.

Mistake #3: Too Much Cardio

It is common for new gym members to do strictly cardio. The main reasons for this is because of lack of education and competence with resistance training coupled

with the fact that walking on a treadmill or biking on a stationary bike are easily done and do not require any technique learning. By incorporating more resistance training into your workouts you will tax different energy systems, build muscle and increase your metabolism more than cardio alone, resulting in a better over body composition change.

Mistake #4: The Wrong Exercises

For those who do incorporate resistance training into their plan, it helps to do the right exercises. Most commonly,

new gym members navigate to machines which is a great idea as there is less coordination and skill needed. The problem I see most often is the over use of isolation movements over compound movements. The preacher curl machine and delt side raise machine get utilized for multiple sets while the shoulder and leg press machines often go unused. For better overall results, use more compound movement machines such as leg press, shoulder press, pulldowns and rows and fewer isolation machines for better muscle development and to burn more calories.

Mistake #5: No Change in Diet

This is probably the biggest mistake of all!! People still believe they can out train bad nutrition and bust their butt for that first month and cannot understand why they are not getting the results they want. If you truly want to change your health, wellness and body composition, start with a healthy diet

then move on to exercise or do both at the same time. Exercise alone most often leaves new gym members feeling frustrated. Your workout is roughly one hour out of the day.

Ask A Farmer


When can I start planting vegetables, and can I start planting certain vegetables earlier than others?

We spoke to Robert from Miramichi Feeds on May 19th and he said we can start planting certain vegetables now. Onions, carrots, yellow beans, radishes and beets to name a few, are frost tolerant and can be planted now, seeded directly in the ground. If you plant yellow beans now the ground is warm enough to germinate them but they wouldn't get tall



enough for the frost to hurt them. For bedding plants, those you've started to grow in the house or purchase already started, such as tomatoes and peppers, definitely wait until the last frost before planting them.

The longer you wait the warmer the ground is and the faster the crop will grow. So even if you plant your crop in June and your neighbour plants in May, in the long run you won't be that far behind in harvesting because yours will grow



faster in the warmer weather.

He also adds that all this could change if we suddenly get a real snappin cold frost that wipes out everything but that is uncharacteristic for our region. Nevertheless, keep an eye on the weather and frost warnings.

Succession Planting

Beans, beets, lettuce and peas are all great choices for succession planting. Plant a new batch each week so you have a continuous harvest all season.

When is the last frost in our area?

Many use the general rule of thumb of waiting until after the first full moon in June to ensure there is no more frost. The full moon falls on June 20, 2016.

Jalloo is part conference with workshops, displays, and presentations; part festival with the animation festival and game jam; part job fair with the student showcase; and part STEM promotion. We showcase a games arcade, introduction to code aimed at children and women, 3D printing competition, and DIY trebuchet. There is something for anyone with any level of interest in animation and games.



Jalloo - ja•lloo [jah•lu]: noun; from the Manx Gaelic dictionary picture, figure, bust, sculpture, idol, drawing, effigy, altarpiece, image, carving, icon, painting, or statue. It is a Gaelic name that represents the culture of the Miramichi.

At NBCC we train artists and game students in the Applied Arts program. Students learn to draw and code game concepts and prototypes. These students design and develop entertainment products which potentially can be exported worldwide. Gogii games, international exporter in Moncton,

have taken our practicum students for over a decade and they will be featuring their games at a Jalloo booth. Companies and their staff will be featured in professional workshops at Jalloo including themes such as:

- Video Game Law What Should You Know?
- Bootstrapping a Game Start-up
- How to Break Into the Game Industry
- Managing Game Dev Complexity
- Game Design in a Mobile Context

Games are not just for PC's anymore. Games are complex and very competitive. We display mobile games and smartglass technologies including an Oculus Rift wing. In this wing. we feature "Cool" stereo virtual reality videos from MVHS students and staff, Ashley Hallihan. Many technologies from 3D Scanning to 3D printing will be featured at Jalloo this year.

Jalloo is hosting an open house on Thursday June 9th in the Gym. Some of the new events being featured are Drone League Races on June 9th from 4:30–6 pm to allowing the schools to participate in six Drones which will fly through hoops and cross a finish line for three time trials. These drones are not just to fly for fun. NBCC use drones to fly thermal instruments to analyze and even count blueberries and perform environmental wood turtle reconnaissance.

On the last day, Jalloo will be featuring 3D Prints from ASD-N local schools. A 3D Print {Art}iculate contest will be held from 10:30 am – 1 pm to showcase 3D prints from many schools in the STEMnorth labs and outreach programs. Trophies and prizes will be handed out to successful winners for both the Drone races and 3D print contest. This will help bring more STEM games and art to the community schools. NBCC have provided funds for prizes for the ASD-N stemnorth events through the Community Engagement Fund.

24 Hour Game Jam

4pm Friday June 10 to 4pm Saturday June 11

At 4pm Friday, individuals with an interest in game art (2D and 3D), audio, programming, and design will gather together to hear the theme and constraints around which they must build teams and then build an international game. Come as individuals and form your team on the spot with the help of some social exercises. Participants will be students and professionals alike. Four computer labs will be open around the clock for teams to plan and implement their games. Coffee and snacks will be provided. At 4pm Saturday, exhausted triumphant teams will present but accomplishments and share their sorrows in the main theatre.

Jalloo is all about networking, especially for Atlantic Canada. We host a professional networking dinner included in the registration. The City of Miramichi kindly support this dinner and the venue every year. The City of Miramich host a lot of festivals every year and this little gem is an art of culture for the entertainment in us all.

Time to Walk. Time to Find a Cure.

In June the ALS Society of New Brunswick and Nova Scotia will celebrate ALS Awareness Month by hosting their annual Walk for ALS fundraisers. The Walk for ALS brings together almost 1000 walkers, donors, clients and volunteers in both provinces to raise money and awareness. The Miramichi Walk for ALS will be held on June 18th, 2016 at French Fort Cove with registration beginning at 10 am.

ALS (Amyotrophic Lateral Sclerosis), also known as Lou Gehrig's disease, is a terminal disease that attacks and kills the motor neurons in the body, denying

those affected the ability to move, to speak, ultimately to breathe. The ALS Society of New Brunswick Nova and Scotia provides direct support to 100-150 people living with ALS each year.

ALS Facts:

- Two to three Canadians a day die of ALS.
- Approximately 3,000 Canadians currently live with ALS.
- In at least 90% of the **ALS** strikes cases,

individuals with no family history of the disease.

- ALS can strike anyone, regardless of age, sex or ethnic origin.
- Nearly 90% of people with ALS will die within five years of diagnosis.
- ALS affects the whole family.
- ALS is a costly disease; emotionally, physically and financially.

The Walk for ALS is an amazing fundraiser with 60% of proceeds going back into the community to support individuals with ALS and their families living in New Brunswick and Nova Scotia. The other 40% of the proceeds go to support ongoing ALS research which is happening all across Canada. Currently in the Maritimes, there are two teams working to help fight ALS. Dr Victor Rafuse and his team in Halifax are working at the Brain Repair Centre on muscle activation in an ALS mouse model with light therapy. Dr. Pier Morin and his team at the University of Moncton are working on a definitive test to diagnose ALS earlier and accurately. The goal is to make ALS treatable, not terminal by 2024.

The Miramichi Walk for ALS starts at 10 am and

throughout the event there will be live entertainment, a FREE BBQ for all who participate, and jumping castles provided by the Miramichi Fun Zone. This family event focuses on making the day fun and memorable for those affected by ALS, along with their friends, family, caregivers, and community.

We have Miramichi's goal this year at \$15,000 but together Miramichiers can do it! We

The Blackville Women's Institute

Active in the community for 85 Years.

The Blackville Women's Institute celebrated Heritage Week in February with the theme "Leadership and Legacy". Eleanor Donald, secretary, spoke of the Women's Institute's work in Blackville:

I will speak on Legacy which means something handed down. I have in my hand a book entitled Fifty Years of Women's Institute in New Brunswick. This was handed down by Mrs. Jessie (Clever) Morehouse, a very dedicated member.

Many may think the Women's Institute is a group of women holding a meeting every month to have a chat. This is not so. This organization or gathering was first started February 11th\ 1897, which is why we celebrate February as our birthday month. A young mother in Stoney Creek, Ontario, after the death of her first born son from drinking impure milk, was compelled to save other women from such a heartbreak by studying the principles underlying healthful nutrition and to pass them on to the local women.

This is how the sterilization of milk began. One hundred and one (101) women and one man attended her first meeting.

That young mother, Adelaide Hoodless, never dreamed that 3300 Canadian Branches with a membership of 90,000 from PEI to the Yukon would later exist. Also, that a golden chain of Institutes would be formed around the world. Even Queen Mary was President of her Branch and other Queens have followed in her footsteps to this day. Today you can visit "The Adelaide Hoodless Home" in Stoney Creek, Ontario.

Now, coming back to New Instance Brunswick's first Institute, it was started in Andover, NB in 1911 with 40 ladies in attendance. There were no cars or paved highways so they travelled by horse and buggy. At that time women had NO VOTE and were not encouraged to hang about when men were talking "Politics". Mrs. James Porter organized the first

meeting as her husband was an MLA and business man who travelled around the country. She often accompanied him to meetings but sat outside tending the horse. Women would often come to speak with her as they lived in out of the way places and were lonely, so they often unburdened their troubles on trips to Ontario and Ouebec.

learned of the great benefits women were receiving from the Women's Institute. So, that is how and why she organized a Branch in Andover. From these meetings they learned cooking, sewing and other skills. They lobbied the New Brunswick Provincial Government for a sidewalk through the village; a bridge across the St. John River between Perth and Andover; a drinking fountain for the school; an oil stove; books; Christmas treats, and more.

Centre Napan was the second Women's Institutute in June 1911. Then, in 1918 the Acadians formed an organization.

During the Fall/Winter of 1918 - 1919, all Women's Institutes were called upon to fight the Flu Epidemic. The women were enlisted as nurses and helpers providing special diets, etc. During World War 11 they wound bandages, knit socks, made quilts and sent parcels to soldiers overseas.

The Blackville W. I. was organized on October 28th 1931 with Mrs. Burt

Underhill as President. Today, the W. I. is still active with eleven members. We meet the 2nd Tuesday of the month at 10:00 am except July and August. We donate to the Cancer Society, Fireman's July Parade, Children's treats for the Santa Clause Parade, Terry Fox Campaign, Food Bank, Transition House, Pennies for Friendship and more. We also give scholarships to one or two Blackville High School graduates as well as to a Granddaughter or Grandson of one our members.

We send delegates to the ACWW meeting in April and to the District and Provincial Conventions and we attend one of the Rogersville meetings and invite them to our February Birthday Luncheon Meeting.

We contribute to the New Brunswick Women's Institute Home for Seniors in Woodstock. One of our local WI members, Mrs. Dorothy (Arthur) Dunphy is now a resident there.

In November we lay a Remembrance Cross at the graveside of a veteran, most times one who has no relatives living here.

Perhaps you wonder how 11 members get the money to support all these groups and organizations.

Money is raised to support these organizations through:

- 3. The Annual Craft & Food Sale

"Could it be an old rock climbing or rappelling ring?" Frank Fitzgerald asked.

June Gallant guessed, "A rock anchor. Hammer the end into rock and use the loop to anchor whatever needs to be secured."

Bill Dunnett said, "The old item in your March/ April issue is for retrieving logs that escaped from a log boom. A length of rope was tied to the ring, the other end was tied to the boat. They would drive the boat up beside the log and a man would drive the sharp point on the ring into the log. Several rings were used so they




could move on to the next log without stopping."





Memories of The Old Store

In the early years when Mr. & Mrs. (British Nathaniel) Underhill were running the store, they would order a puncheon of molasses, a barrel of vinegar, one of salt pork, one of corned beef and salt herring. There would be kendals of cod fish, wooden boxes of smoked digbies (digby cod), raisins and dates as well as dried apples and prunes. They also ordered 50 lb. Bags of coarse salt, 100 lb. Bags of white sugar and brown sugar, bags of oatmeal, corn meal, beans and oats (for horses).

All of these items would be sent up from Newcastle on the freight train, which made a trip to Fredericton every second day.

There was a train siding close by their house and store, which made it very convenient for their supplies to be delivered.

They had practically everything in their store. Mrs. B.N. had a glass showcase with needles, thread, yarn, etc. She also carried yards of pretty cotton print for making aprons. In the showcase also were straight pins, hairpins and hairnets. She

said no woman had the right to cook or make butter without having a hair net over her hair. She had all the items necessary for daily living in those days including yeast cakes, oil lamps, toilet soap and talcum powder.

Each family could get their supplies and pay for them at the end of the month. She kept a record of each item in a big "Bear" scribbler and it was always 100% correct.

Included among their supplies were scribblers, pencils and slates as the school was close by. An exciting thing for the children were big red suckers that sold for 1¢ each, also chewing gum which was often referred to as "boughten gum" (as opposed to spruce gum from the trees). All the various varieties of tobacco were available also as well as nails and rabbit wire at 5¢ a roll.

The little store was a wonderful place to gather in the evenings to swap yarns and gather the current news. There were more logs hauled and more horses traded there than any place in the county.

This all occurred in the building which is now Darlene's Tea House.
