Household Tips and Hints By Anthony McLean

With a month into the season of Spring, I like to check out tips and hints to use around my home. I found these ones to be worth sharing with readers. Each of them are simple and easy to make with ingredients that can be found in your home! Check them out, be innovative and have fun while doing it on your own, or with family or friends ... and save money!

Do you have dangling power cords around your home that could be hazardous? I have a safe and reliable solution to remedy this in one step! Take a paper towel, plastic wrap, wax paper or foil wrap core and push your cord or bar through to keep them covered and protect your children or pets from harm's way!



Did you know that vodka can be used for things other than a drink?

Flower Preserver - Spray flower stems with a 2:1 ratio mix of vodka and sugar. Repeat every few days.

Laundry Freshener - Fill a small spray bottle with vodka and lightly



spray clothes. The vodka smell goes away when the clothes dry completely. The vodka helps to remove any unwanted odours.

Stain Remover - Vodka effectively gets rid of ink, grass and lipstick stains. Dab stain with vodka and rub the stain away. Add the stained garment to the laundry afterwards for a more thorough clean.

Don't burn fingers with a short match or lighter! With matches or lighters, light candles or grills with a dry spaghetti noodle. It is a lot safer and simple.

Cleaning floors with peppermint tea!

I never thought one of my favourite hot beverages/ flavoured teas could be used to clean hardwood floors. Here's the recipe:

Steep 6 peppermint tea bags into a quart of water. Add one-quarter cup of white vinegar.Add 10 drops of tea tree oil as a disinfectant. Store in a spray bottle, and spritz your mop and clean.

This mixture, because of the

vinegar and the essential oils, will keep for a long time, under your sink.

Never blow balloons up again!

All you need is: Baking Soda, Vinegar, Plastic Bottle, Balloons, 2 Funnels

1. Using a funnel pour vinegar into your bottle. You only need to fill about 1/3 of the bottle.

2. Using another (dry) funnel pour baking soda into your balloon. Fill the balloon about 1/2 way.

3. Cover the top of the bottle with you balloon. Make sure you don't let the baking soda spill into the bottle prematurely.

4. When ready, lift your balloon and let the baking soda fall into the vinegar.

5. Watch as the mixture fizzes, bubbles and expands your balloon!

7. Repeat! Believe me, your kids will want to do this more than once.

Spring Birds at Miramichi Marsh

Miramichi Marsh (Miramichi Nature Trail) – Located near "Retirement Miramichi" features approximately 2 kilometres of easy to walk trails that wind around three ponds and skirt an extensive marsh area. The trails offer an excellent opportunity to view a wide variety of birds that enjoy a fresh water habitat. There is also a nearby good mix of wooded and open areas that support a diversity of songbirds. Members of the Miramichi Naturalists' Club have recorded in excess of 100 bird species either inhabiting this area in the summer of using it as a stopping off point during migration. May through July are perhaps the best months to visit as the area is very active through the breeding season. As many as eight



duck species raise their young in these ponds and marshlands in addition to Pied-billed Grebes, Sora, Tree Swallows and Eastern Kingbirds and of course Canada Geese. King fishers, Northern Harriers and Merlins also make frequent visits.

Miramichiers Who Giv'er! Meet Lloyd Cameron

Recently I had the privilege of interviewing another Miramichier who knows how to Giv'er! Each of the people I have interviewed so far for this regular feature have affected me in some way. After I conducted this interview, I paused and reflected on our conversation. He definitely represents the kind of man that I aspire to be. I felt at ease talking to him. He was calming, witty, genuine, and I am proud to have him as a friend. When I asked him what the word "giv'er" means to him, he replied "Participation, giving back, contributing and sharing your gifts and talents to enhance others and the community around you." And throughout his lifetime on the Miramichi, he has certainly done that. We met at the Creative Grounds Cafe in Chatham and this was my conversation with Lloyd Cameron.

AM: What was your childhood like?

LC: I grew up in Loggieville on a little farm in a family of nine (five girls and four boys). Four were born before the Second World War and five after, so it was like two families with such a large age gap between each group of siblings. I am the middle in the second family. It was a fun idealized childhood, not like today, as young people don't utilize the creative outlet of playing outside, rather spending a lot of time indoors with video games. We did a lot of exploring in the woods, went swimming in the summertime almost everyday, either at Tyrrell's Point or over the bank at Kingston's shore, played a lot of cricket and baseball and did farming chores. My family had chickens, cows, horses and pigs. We always had a large garden, and in the autumn we did having. Our house was situated among five other farms that in most cases had an individual of the same age, which gave us about four or five playmates in the neighbourhood.

AM: Where did you attend school?

LC: I graduated from Chatham High School in 1968, and then went on to Teacher's College in Fredericton, and then to UNB Fredericton for my Bachelor of Arts and Bachelor of Education. In the summertime while I was going to University, I worked on the Survey Crew for the Department of Highways and was a caretaker of the Pine Grove Cemetery, using a "push" mower and not a "sit-on" mower. I taught at Chatham Junior High School for 16 years, which later became Dr. Losier Jr. High, with one year out in Donnelly, Alberta teaching Reading and Resource to Grades 1 to 3 and then James M. Hill Memorial High School for 17 years, from where I retired. I worked for 33 years in the Education system.



AM: What did you enjoy most during your career?

LC: I taught Language Arts at the Middle School, English Literature and Theatre Arts at the High School level as well as being the English Department Head. Overall, I thoroughly loved teaching, interacting with the students, and exposing them to different themes and concepts in all genres of literature and introducing them to the wonderful world of reading. As well, I enjoyed my involvement with theatre and drama, which is a passion of mine.

AM: What motivated you to create Double L Productions?

LC: I have been passionately involved with theatre since High School. I directed one-act plays, of which I took to the Provincial Drama Festivals for 31 years in a row. I was involved in, directed and produced plays for the Miramichi Choral Society. I also had been an actor in the Miramichi Players, the Loggie House Players and other adult drama groups. After I retired, I missed being actively involved in theatre, so I decided to form my own company. Double L Productions was founded in September 2006, right here in the Miramichi. My first production was held at the Beaverbrook Kin Centre and it was the musical comedy Nunsense. Others include: Godspell, Blithe Spirit, Love Letters, Julian, The Fantasticks, Love, Loss & What I Wore, Mary's Wedding, and most recent was Waiting For The Parade. As well, I was an Assistant Director with Sam Crowell for his play On The Wind. It is difficult to say which would be my favorite, as each production provided a personal level of satisfaction with its creation and development of characters. The greatest satisfaction comes from working with the amazing talented individuals who act as the characters to bring my vision to life.

AM: Besides Double L Productions, do you do any volunteering in or around the community? Do you have any other hobbies and interests?

LC: Yes, I enjoy photography, kayaking, music, anything to do with the Arts, movies and I am an avid reader—BIG TIME! I am on the Board of Directors for the W.S. Loggie Cultural Centre, serving as treasurer, Chairperson on the

Board of the Vogue Group, treasurer of the Miramichi Liberal Association, and am an active member of Saint Andrew's United Church, Wellington Street, having just finished a three year term as Chair of the Council. As well, I assist behind the scenes with other various organizations in the area. I received recognition for Community Volunteerism from the Province of New Brunswick on Canada Day one year, and was recently inducted into the James M. Hill Wall of Fame by the James M. High School Alumni Association, which was a tremendous and humbling honour.

AM: Is there anything you'd like to add?

LC: I would like to say thanks for the continuous support the community has shown Double L Productions since its founding and also to the individuals who have donated their time and energy both on and behind the scenes of each production, which is very much appreciated.

Kale Chips Recipe

Kale chips make a light, crispy snack that is packed with vitamins and anti-oxidants. This summer add some kale to your garden so you can make this tasty treat yourself.

Ingredients

- Fresh Kale Leaves
- 1 to 2 Tblsp olive oil depending on how many you are making
- salt and spices to season (optional)

Directions

1. The key to making crispy kale chips without burning them is to go **"low and slow"** with the baking. Pre-heat oven to 300F and line a baking sheet with parchment paper.

2. Thoroughly **wash and dry** the kale leaves. You don't want any water left on them or they'll end up soggy. Press them between paper towels, shake them, air dry them and leave them on the counter for awhile to until you're sure they are dry.

3. **Separate the leaves** from the stems. You can use a knife or an easy way is to hold the stem between your fingers and slide the other hand up the stem to remove the leaves. Tear them into bite sizes pieces.

4. Place the kale leaves in a big bowl and **drizzle with olive oil**. Using your hands massage the oil into the leaves so they are all lightly coated.


5. Add salt and whatever other **seasoning** you like, or leave them bare. Some people use chili powder or garlic and others like cinnamon! Be cautious with the salt! The kale will shrink up and the flavours will condense.

6. Spread the kale onto the baking sheet in a single layer - don't overcrowd the kale! Bake for 25 minutes. Rotate the pan halfway through. They will shrink up and brown slightly. Smaller pieces will cook faster so check on them before the time is up and remove any that are already cooked. Let cool for 3 minutes and enjoy immediately.







Vimy Ridge Never Leaves You


Arrive at Vimy Ridge before the sun rises to 8 am. Arrive while the birds are breaking the silent dawn with song. Arrive while mist still lingers and swirls in the shell craters.

Stand. Face the monument. Be still. Listen. Feel the powerful sense of presence in this sacred place, a presence that is waiting and aware.

Is it the spirits of the 100,000 French casualties who died on their attempts to take the seven kilometre ridge? Have they united with the dead from our own four Canadian divisions? One hundred years ago, our troops succeeded where the larger French and British offensives failed but at great cost of life: 3598 killed and 7000 wounded.

Perhaps the dream by Walter Alward, sculptor of the Vimy Monument speaks to this presence. In an interview in 1921, he said he was inspired by a dream.

"When things were at their blackest in France, I went to sleep one night after dreaming of the muck and misery over there ... my spirit was like a thing tormented ... I dreamed I was in a great battlefield. I saw our men going in by the thousands and being mowed down by the sickles of death ... Suffering beyond endurance at the sight, I turned my eyes and found myself looking down an avenue of poplars. Suddenly through the avenue I saw thousands marching to the aid of our armies. They were the dead. They rose in masses, filed silently by and entered the fight to aid the



living. So vivid was this impression that when I awoke it stayed with me for months. Without the dead we were helpless. So I have tried to show this monument to Canada's fallen, what we owed them and would forever owe them."

You can walk through several trenches lined in neat stone, long clean of the muck, blood and bodies. On your way to the monument, you can mark the shell craters lined with grass and wild flowers. They are behind a wire barrier; many of the fields are still alive with unexploded ordnance.

Even at a distance the monument is massive, and overwhelming in beauty and significance on arrival.

It marks the 11,285 Canadian soldiers who have no known graves. Thousands make pilgrimage yearly. Read the names.

Marvel at the figures vision of Alward. Stand beside the figure of "Canada Mourning her Sons" as she looks down on the Douai Plains 145 metres below. The monument was placed here where the Canadians captured the highest point of the ridge in a frontal bayonet charge against machine gun positions.

Think of what this place means to Canadians, to the descendants of the soldiers, to you. Spend time.

When you leave Vimy, you will discover that Vimy Ridge will never leave you.



Spring is in the Air ... Renovations are around the corner!

As soon as the snow melts, we start to think about that list of "must do" home projects that we started over the winter. And sometimes small things turn into a partial or fullscale renovation. Here is my process for a peaceful, organized renovation: Kitchens take at least 6-8 weeks not including demolition, electrical, flooring, space preparation or the tiles and countertops. Talk to your suppliers, cabinet makers and all the trades involved to start with the general lead times and work times

PLAN! Think of this as the map with directions for your project. The plan is much more than a list and a quick phone call to a contractor. If you work with a designer or decorator at this stage, before meeting with a contractor, you will end up with a better result. This is not to say your contractor doesn't know what he is doing, he does! But a design professional will spend time on the fine detail decisions and selections. They will take your hopes and goals, transfer them to paper and ultimately bring



them to life. If you choose to go on your own, be sure to have a single, unified plan to present to the contractor. The easier and the more detailed this is, the more accurate quote a contractor will be able to give you, saving you time and money.

PREPARE! Think of this as your daytimer or calendar for your project. Preparation is more than just cleaning out the space. Create a "work-back schedule", which is a schedule you create starting with the date you would like to be done and working backwards. This is a detailed schedule of order dates, contractor dates, arrival dates, basically every major and minor benchmark of the project. Start with a vague calendar to ensure what you want is possible. For example, say it's a kitchen you work-back schedule it is May 1st.

needed. From there create the schedule and fill in the blanks for more specific details. You cannot get good, cheap and fast. You are better off doing it right the first time.

PROCEED! Think of this like putting your car in drive, it's time to put the wheels in motion for your project. It's time to execute but that doesn't mean you won't still have paperwork to do. The first steps will include awarding your contractor the job, obtaining permits and having initial meetings with your designer and contractor together. If you need materials,

furniture or lighting, ordering that will be the next step. Allow for order times in your work-back schedule. It is better to have all the "order" items waiting in the schedule queue rather than holding up the project trying to find it.

Clients ask, how did you do it on TV? How did it come together smoothly and look beautiful? Truthfully the preparation took months, but it was worth it. Remember, be reasonable, be firm, but be friendly! Happy Renovation Season.

Searching for Sutherlands

by Richard Sutherland, an 'undocumented' Miramichi Sutherland

My 2nd great grandfather, Robert Sutherland (1809-1870) married Elizabeth Thain on 10 July 1838 in Ludlow Parish, New Brunswick. I have evidence (photos of the Ludlow Parish Tax Rolls) suggesting that Robert met Elizabeth in 1837 while both Sutherlands and Thains were working at the lumber camp in Boiestown on the Miramichi. In addition, my 1st great grandfather, Jairus Copperthwaite Sutherland (really his name) was born on 22 Nov 1842, probably in Durham Bridge when Robert, Elizabeth and two infant daughters were leaving Boiestown after the downturn in the lumber industry on the Miramichi in the early 1840's.

Finally, I believe that my Robert was the youngest son of the George Sutherland, who was one of first settlers of this branch of the Miramichi as described by William Mackinnon in this excellent book, *Over the Portage: Early History of the Upper Miramichi.*

I have been unable to document the connection of my Robert to the aforementioned George and am looking for male Miramichi Sutherlands willing to submit a Y-DNA sample to prove our kinship. I'd pay for the cost of this testing. To contact Richard email him at richard.sutherland48@gmail.com.

This Old Thing

In our last issue Bernie Colepaugh of the Miramichi Folklore Park in Renous sent a photo of an old thing and asked our readers if they could identify it.

We received quite a few responses. Esma Brennan thought it was an item used for making dowels and said there would also be a crank of some kind attached. Ken St.Germain agreed that it was a carpenter's dowelling tool that attaches to a brace and bit tool and allows one to make dowels or spindles of different sizes. And Linda Bremner's husband, David concurred that this was a furniture makers tool for making dowel rods for chair backs.

Graham Mclaughlin said it was a carpenter's tool that makes a design in wood perhaps on a piece of crown moulding. Bill Walker suggested it was a Hollow Auger. June Gallant suggested the item was an old lathe used for either wood or metal. Jim Travis called it a Wheelwrights' Hollow Auger and said it was used to shape tenons on wheel spokes but was also used by chairmakers and ladder makers etc. for tenon shaping.

Jimmie Crawford wrote: "68 years ago I saw a tool like this at work by a Blacksmith named Jack Colford in Blackville. He called it a spoke beveler. It was used to make spokes for wooden wagon wheels, different size holes. He would pat the spoke in a wooden vice and



turn it with a brace used for boring holes with different size bits. It was also used to bevel wooden chair rungs."

Thanks for all the responses! Bernie says, "This is a tool used in a brace (as in brace and bits) for turning down the ends of wooden dowels for chair rungs, wagon wheels, etc."




