

Miramichi Festival of Tall Ships July 7-9

This summer the river comes alive with the Miramichi Festival of Tall Ships!

On Friday July 7th, 2017 welcome the Tall Ships from the shore. Ships set sail from Escuminac at 12 noon to dock in Chatham and Newcastle. Enjoy live **music** from 6-8 pm on the wharfs Friday and Saturday night. On Saturday and Sunday tour the Tall Ships at both wharfs! There will be Face Painting and family activities at both locations all day long! See the Tall Ships from the water in a 26 foot Voyageur Canoe, enjoy a historic picnic on Beaubears Island in period costume, venture into Wilson's Point for a nighttime Graveyard Tour, meet the Tall Ships captains, and much more!

Daily events also include the return of the **Pirates of Halifax!** There will be plenty of free photo opportunities for the whole family. See the Tall Ships from the air by taking a helicopter ride with Advanced Heli-Flight Ltd. It's \$60 per person for a six minute tour. "The Very Best!" Car Show in Atlantic Canada

In 1994, the Goodie Shop Restaurant decided to host a car show. 

Book Review by James M. Fisher, The Miramichi Reader For the Love of It: 60 Years of the Miramichi Folksong Festival by Susan Butler

The Miramichi Folksong Festival has been held continuously for 60 years now, making it the longest standing folk song festival in Canada. Its director (and a performer) of the past 35 years is the irrepressible Susan Butler, a true "Miramichier" if there ever was one. Now, she has compiled the Festival's history as well as her own in a self-published book entitled For the Love of It: 60 Years of the Miramichi Folksong Festival. Ms Butler states:

"It took me five years to get myself organized to write it but I felt it was time to document such an institution."

It also ties in nicely with the Canada 150

celebrations, for the prime mover behind the eventual founding of the festival was none other than Chatham native Max Aitken, (Lord Beaverbrook) who commissioned his friend Louise Manny to go out and collect the folk songs of the Miramichi region.

From its small beginnings as an open mic event (no instruments were allowed) to its resurgence in the Butler years, the Miramichi Folksong Festival has hosted acts large and small, from across the ocean and the US as well. It runs for five days and features five days of "authentic, traditional and contemporary music" for the whole family!

The true value of For the Love of It lies in the reminiscences of Ms Butler and several others, photographs (B&W and colour) of past participants and volunteers as well as a fine introduction by Miramichi author Wayne Curtis. Many of the names included in the book will be familiar to



Miramichiers and Festival attendees alike.

One particularly poignant story is that of festival regular Perley Hare, who after performing one night in 1988, crossed the street to the Black Horse Tavern for a drink and promptly dropped dead. Ms Butler was soon informed of his passing, but she stoically kept on with the evening's program, even though it was difficult to maintain composure. "Perley certainly left a legacy. Since that evening in 1988, the festival remembers and celebrates the life of Perley Hare with a Kitchen Party at the Black Horse Tavern" where a toast is drunk to Perley.

A book of approximately 135 pages, For the Love of It is well worth the price of \$20.

It is a labour of love by Ms Butler, as is the festival itself.



Having worked in cities like New York, Toronto and Vancouver, one of the things I most enjoy in big cities is getting to know what the folks who are native to the area appreciate and enjoy most. Truly, as daunting as a big city may feel to some, often they are mere neighbourhood communities similar to the small towns and villages of this region. The folks all know one another, share the same schools with their children and frequent the same local haunts or attractions. On her first trip to the Big Apple, my motherin-law Antoinette was pleasantly surprised by how safe, small and friendly the local neighbourhoods were. On the design front, we wanted it to feel refined yet simple. Not so fancy that you'd feel uncomfortable but designed well enough that you know it's all about the atmosphere, comfort and a warm-friendly space for you and your friends to enjoy. We took from what we heard the locals talk about and love. The woods, the culture and of course, moose! The moment you walk in you know you are some place different but very welcoming and cozy. The banquettes line the walls from one end to the other for the ultimate in comfortable seating and the bar is fun, with barn board clad walls and a draft tap in the centre. Not forgetting where they came from, the bar also has a feature stage that will have music every Friday and Saturday night, everything from local talent request nights to big names from the region. I know you'll want to come for an amazing meal and then stay for the show!

You may say I am biased because I was part of the design team, but truly you will want to put this on your list of places to visit AND eat! It's just not a Cottage ... it's a Dream Cottage!

With the sign of Spring turning into summer we know two things are consistent in the region, warmer days are ahead of us and the Miramichi Big Brothers Big Sisters Dream Cottage is just about complete for its new winner. Celebrating 20 years of cottages, this year was no different, except the team at Décor Haute Look partnered with them to create beautiful interiors. Having the privilege of working with Julie, Johanne and team, I wanted to share some tips on how to create a cottage look that feels as beautiful as a home.



Here are three tips and tricks to give your cottage the designer look:

Tip #1 - Create a focal point in each room.

Often times when folks decorate the cottage they forget some of the rules of good design. One rule is to create a focal point in a room. A focal point can do two small miracles in a space. First, it can give you a starting point or jump start to your design feel and accent colour. In the case of the dream cottage, one of the bedrooms we used beautiful wallpaper from JF Fabrics. It has a gorgeous yellow flower in the wallpaper in which we were able to use that colour subtly in the bedding and pillows. Second, it can make the room look larger and more pulled together. By flanking the headboards with a wallpaper, we were able to draw one's eye into the room instead of noticing the actual amount of space. Creating a feeling of space and grandeur.

Tip #2 – Perfectly proportionate furniture.

Sometimes the cottage plays second fiddle to the home. It is sort of like the "hand-me-downs" from the older sibling to the younger, the home



gets the "good stuff" and the cottage gets the remnants. Depending on the look of the furniture or moreover the size, the furniture could be the right fit. However, most times the furniture is scaled for a larger home than a smaller cottage. Not to say that all cottage furniture should be petite in size and scale, but proportionate to the room's size is key. When



selecting the furnishings for the cottage we paid close attention to the scale and sizes of the pieces and where they would be placed. For example, the living area had a third the space leaving space for a dining area and kitchen island. Thus, we selected a sofa that would keep within the one third of the space parameter.

Tip #3 – Accessories that create the room and set the mood.

I always say, "Themes are for parks, not for homes. However, setting the mood is key to creating a happy home" or in this case a happy cottage. We wanted to create a space create your space, one of the design mistakes often made is pushing the "theme" too far. Subtle hints are better than bold statements. With a focal point, right sized furniture and accessories that create your feeling of cottage, you now have the winning combination to create a space you will love. With some of the designer secrets we have shared with you, we hope you enjoy this summer cottage season as much as we hope to this year.

From Goose Park to The Town Square

Notes on the Public Square, Newcastle, copied from the files of the Union Advocate in The Old Manse Library, Newcastle, by Simon Driscoll and E. MacDonald.

Advocate, May 19, 1870:

The wooden fence around the Square is being torn down, to be replaced at an early date by a neat chain fence. This will be a

decided improvement. While speaking upon this subject, we would like to know for information, whose duty it is to remove the pile of sawdust deposited in the Square last fall for skating rink purposes. Will the gentlemen in charge of the Square see to it and have it removed at once. I must be very annoying to persons who have any regard for order and cleanliness, to see the heap remaining week after week, without any effort being made for its removal.

Advocate, May 19, 1880:

During the week the gentlemen in charge of the Public Square have planted a number of elm and other trees within the enclosure. We trust their efforts to beautify that portion of the town once

known as "The Goose Park" will be The fountain in the Town Square, as it looks today. seconded by the people in protecting the Photo by Anthony McLean trees, fences, etc. from damage.

Advocate, June 19, 1889:

The drinking fountain has been placed in position on that portion of the square facing the Post Office. The grass has been cut down and with some cleaning up the Square will be ready in a day or two for the celebration of Dominion Day. If the citizens unite in making the Garden Party a success the proceeds will be used for the erection of a jet fountain in the centre of the Square which will make it one of the most beautiful spots in this locality. The Square Committee for some years past have worked energetically to turn what was formerly ironically termed the Goose Park into an ornament to our town and they have succeeded most admirably and visitors invariably speak in terms of praise of the beauty of Newcastle Square.

Advocate, July 3, 1889:

The Dominion Day Celebration. As soon as it became dark the stores and residences were lighted up and made a fine appearance, detailed descriptions next week. Dancing (in the Square) was commenced shortly after 9 p.m. and ended at 12 p.m. The Moncton

Band provided music. A charge of 10 cents was made for admission to the Square in the evening and was paid by a large number; those objecting to the fee jumping over the fence. The refreshment booth was well patronized. Early in the evening the merry-go-round broke down under the weight of its load and that put an end to that favorite sport of amusement. No one was hurt.


Advocate, June 28, 1893:

A Fountain – Mr. P. Keating, caretaker of the Park, has placed from the artesian well in the centre of the park a pipe and rose which throws a small spray of water all around it and adds to the beauty of the park very materially. Its appearance this year does him credit.

Advocate, August 14, 1895:

Some years ago an artesian well was sunk in the Newcastle Park (The Square) and a fine flow of water obtained, the intention being to have a fountain erected in the centre of the Park, but as there is no fund to draw upon for necessary improvements and repairs that laudable intention has failed of completion. We understand that Mr. Thomas Russell has expressed his intention of erecting a fountain and the contract has been given to Mr. C.E. Fish who is proceeding with the work. The excavation is now being made, stone for the fountain and a derrick are on the ground and shortly, through the public spirit and generosity of Mr. Russell the Fountain will be completed and throwing its stream of water into the air to still further beautify this pleasant spot in the centre of the town.





Advocate, August 12, 1896:

For the Benefit of the Square. The steam "merry-go-round" which has been in the town for the past ten days has been receiving a good share of public patronage every evening. We are requested to state that arrangements have been made with the proprietors to have the "Merry-go-Round" run for one night for the benefit of The Square and the probability is that the rush of patrons will be large. This (Wednesday) evening is the date appointed and if you wish to aid in keeping the Square as an ornament and attraction to the town then do something to help pay the current expenses of keeping it in order by patronizing the Merry-Go-Round, have a good time and aid a worthy object.

Advocate, Wed. July 17, 1901:

The grass in the park has turned brown for lack of rain. On Saturday, the hand engine was run out on the Public Wharf and the trees and grass were well watered.

Advocate, August 21, 1901:

This evening the beautiful fountain recently completed will be formally presented to the town by the donors Messrs. Thomas Russell and George Brown representing his son, D.R.C. Brown of Aspen, Col., who donated the basin. The fount is of French Fort stone, turned at Mr. Fish's Quarry, and the basin is of concrete with stone facing from the same quarry, and the whole presents an appearance that does credit to the donors, the manufacturers and

the town.

The evening was all that could be desired as far as weather was concerned and the streets were early thronged with citizens to hear the presentation address and speeches by the Mayor and others.

The Park was very tastefully decorated with Chinese lanterns, torches, etc. and reflected credit on the Committee members Messrs. William Murray, Edmonds and T.W. Hay, who had that part of the program to look after. It was the general opinion that the Park never looked better, walks nicely cleaned, trees trimmed, and the fountain playing. The fireworks and the colored lights set off the fountain to perfection. At 7:30 the Band marched down to the Park and opened the program, after which Miss Cannie Armstrong, eldest daughter of R.H. Armstrong, Esq., and niece of Mr. Thomas Russell, turned on the water.

Alderman Hennessy addressed the citizens: "It is now nearly 30 years that a few of our worthy citizens made the first attempt to reclaim this little plot of land that we are now standing on and that we all so much admire. They planted tiny sucklings on this ground, taken from the banks of the millstream. They fenced them in, cared for them until they grew to be what we see them today, majestic trees, with wide-spreading branches to protect us from the burning sun. I may say that we all admire our beautiful Square and we thank most heartily those generous donors who have been instrumental in bringing it to its present attractiveness. It will remain a monument to their memory and generosity.

Three years ago, I wrote in Giv'er Miramichi about my travels in Central America and my project of starting a Community Supported Agriculture program where people would sign up as members and in exchange receive a weekly supply of local and organic vegetables and fruit. The following three years were so full of life—a partner, a baby, a vibrant agricultural community with dynamic young people, a multi-generational family endeavour, and many many pounds of vegetables later, here I still am transplanting, seeding, trying to convince people of the value not only of buying organic but of using your hard earned dollars to sustain our land and the people on it.

Three years ago, my vision wasn't as clear or as full fledged but now, nothing is stopping us. All the farmers at La Terre Partagée, want to see the growth of not only our farm but the local food movement in the region for so many reasons.

Firstly, the feeling of farming as a team is unparalleled. The rows seem much shorter, the weeds much less daunting and the cold or heat much more bearable if you are doing it together. The simple joy of celebrating your hard work with your friends over an ice cream or a swim in the lake is amazing. The connection that this hard work brings us to past generations, to the children that play alongside us and to peasant farmers across the world sustains us through the long hours.

Secondly, we want to grow the diversity of products available within our community and our region and make it

that much easier for those that commit to buying local to do so. So this year, we're back with our selection of over 40 different vegetables and fruit, a variety of meats including ground beef, pork sausages, turkey, chicken, and for those wanting to fill their freezer, boxes of half a pig. We're also adding certified organic eggs to the mix and kombucha, a fermented probiotic filled tea which is not only super healthy but so delicious. This, thanks to our newest farmer who will be working with us but also initiating these new endeavours via our incubation program.

Thirdly, we see farming as much more than a career choice but a path towards rebuilding cohesive communities and taking back control of their economic development. If we, as people, have control over not only the consumption but the production of our food, we enable ourselves to lead healthier lives, support local economies, and give real value to our natural resources.

Whatever happens, a small enthusiastic crew of us will be farming our hearts out in the backs of Rogersville (on Pleasant Ridge), but we would love it if you joined us! You can learn more and become a member of our community supported agriculture program by checking out our website at www.fermeterrepartagee.org/csa or by calling Rebeka at 506 626 0057. Because members agree to pay their vegetables upfront which gives us much more stability and predictability, in exchange, we deliver "shares" twice a week to Miramichi for 18 weeks (between the end of June and the end of October). You can also add on eggs weekly or biweekly and every week, you will have the opportunity to purchase meat or other products from the farm. You can also find us at the Water Street Farmers Market where we will be selling a great variety of local and organic fruits and vegetables. Make us look a bit less crazy by joining our food revolution!





This Old Thing

In our last issue Bernie Colepaugh of the Miramichi Folklore Park in Renous sent a photo of an old thing and asked our readers if they could identify it.

Keith Duthie thought it was a ring knife used for cutting twine. Dave Flynn agreed, "The item is a finger twine cutter. Used to cut twine when baling Christmas trees for shipment." Bill Dunnett concurred and said he still had one. Jacques Bourque wrote, "I



saw this tool being used when I was a child. It was used by a man who came to buy Christmas Trees from local land owners. He wore this tool as a ring on his index finger and he used it to cut the rope that he was using to wrap the Christmas trees before loading them on a truck."

And Jim Weaver from Doaktown agreed, "This is a 'ring knife' for your finger for cutting the cord that you used to tie Christmas trees in a neat bundle for shipping."

Nilah Lyver wrote, "My dad, Todd Stewart said this looks exactly like a band they wore around their finger when tying up Christmas Trees, this was use to cut off the knot quickly with a turn of the finger." June Gallant elaborated, "I can smell the fresh cut Christmas trees now. Dad was a Christmas tree exporter in the 1960s. No automatic balers

back then. We wrapped each tree by hand with Christmas tree twine, your picture is a bailer ring or twine ring. You would wear it on your finger, depending on the length of your tree, you would bale it by wrapping twine around tree, make a slip knot to tighten and use your baling ring to cut the twine, then move on to make the next tie until your tree was tightly secured."

John E. Doran agreed, "Bernie, it's a knife ring used during the baling of Christmas trees. The time period would be mid 1940s after WWII for tree bundles being sent to the USA. The men didn't have to slow down in processing to look for a knife, and as you know, were paid by the bundle, therefore a very important tool needed to improve their weekly wages. My father had one and no one was allowed to touch it for fear of being lost or misplaced. I suspect it was used during other applications using twine/ cord bundling, but my sole exposure to it was Christmas trees."


Richard Kingston wrote, "I have one of these which was made by my uncle Clayton Kingston. He called it a Finger Knife. His uncle, Will Kingston, from Williamstown and later Millerton, was a Christmas tree buyer. The trees were wrapped with baler twine and Clayton used this knife to cut the twine after the knot was tied. Always on the finger, this knife was never misplaced while working at wrapping the trees."


Joseph Trevors, Romeo Hébert and Marshall Bryenton all agreed, but what does Bernie say?
