

PUBLIC WORKS - WINTER MAINTENANCE

The Public Works snow removal crew starts to plow at 3" accumulation and will plow continuous until all streets are plowed full width.

Main arteries and Downtown core receive salt to maintain bare pavement.

Secondary streets and contracted areas receive sand salt mixture during slippery conditions.

Depending on the duration, time and amount of snow, clean up time may vary.

Clean up time expected after a storm is 8am the following day.

Some helpful hints:

- Adopt a fire hydrant that may be close to your house, it may save you or your neighbor
- If a catch basin is located close to your property and you experience flooding, keep it clear.
- When removing snow from your property, avoid large banks at the end of your driveway. It creates poor
 visibility for you and when City crews are maintaining streets full width, filling in your driveway is unavoidable.
- Do not place snow from your driveway on the street. This is a safety hazard for the motoring public and a fine is possible.
- During stormy conditions please follow police advisories and stay off the road unless it is an emergency.

Miramichi on way to Age-Friendly Designation

In April 2017, Miramichi city council adopted a motion to formally join the global movement to become an Age-Friendly Community.

What is an age-friendly community?

- meets the demands of the aging population and promotes active participation by seniors while meeting its community vision for all ages;

-recognizes and supports the value that seniors have in our society and as a result we all benefit from their experience, wisdom and knowledge;

-supports active aging which leads to a better quality of life. People who lead an active life - no matter what their age - are more likely to have good health, participate in society and have social, financial and physical security.

To accomplish this, an age-friendly community designs policies, provides services and infrastructure, and takes action in areas such as housing, health, recreation, social participation, and transportation to assist seniors to realize their full potential and age actively.

Miramichi city council appointed a steering committee of seniors and stakeholders to implement the Age-Friendly Strategy. The committee will be responsible for assessing how age-friendly the community currently is, and then by engaging seniors, will be able to identify any gaps in service and issues which prevent our senior population from aging actively. In March the committee will be surveying Miramichi residents over the age of 55 years to gather this information.

The aging population trend is expected to continue for several decades due to the aging of the baby-boom generation. In 2016, Statistics Canada estimated that there were 5.9 million Canadians aged 65 and older. This figure is expected to double over the next 25 years to reach over 10.4



million seniors by 2036. By 2051, approximately one Canadian in four will be 65 or older. In New Brunswick, 19% of the population was 65 or older in 2016; this statistic will likely increase to 29.4% by 2036. According to the 2016 Census, 23.8% of Miramichi's population is 65 and over, and that percentage is expected to climb to over 40% as the baby boomers continue to age.

Across Canada and internationally, strategies for supporting the development of "Age-Friendly Communities" (AFC) have been put in place. This global movement, initiated by the World Health Organization (WHO) in the 2000s, aims to meet the demands of the accelerated aging of the world population, and encourages communities to promote the active participation of their seniors, and to achieve the vision of a society for all ages.



Tax Tips

Get the most out of your Tax Return

Tax Tips from Irene McCardle, CPA, CMA, CFP

A person can earn up to \$11,635 before they pay any federal tax and up to \$9,895 before they pay any provincial tax

Seniors (age 65 and older) have an additional deduction of \$7,225 federally and \$4,831 provincially.

The **seniors tax credit** is clawed back starting at \$36,430 of income, and is completely eliminated at \$84,597 of net income.

If you have eligible **home accessibility expenses**, you can claim up to \$10,000 as a Federal tax credit on your return.

If you qualify as a **first-time home buyer**, you can deduct up to \$5,000 as a Federal tax credit on your return.

The maximum withdrawal from his/her RRSP towards the purchase of a home (**Home Buyers' Plan**) is \$25,000 – contributions to be repaid over 15 years or included in income annually.

The annual withdrawal from his/her RRSP towards the **Lifelong Learning Plan** is \$10,000 with a maximum limit of \$20,000 – repayments over 15 years, conditions apply.

Volunteer firefighters and search and rescue volunteers can claim a tax credit of \$3,000 on their Federal returns.

The maximum contribution an employee can make to the **Canada Pension Plan** is \$2,564. or 4.95% of his income – which is matched by the employer.

The maximum contribution to **Employment Insurance** by an employee is \$836.19 or 1.63% of his income – the employer pays 1.4 times the employee amount.

The **maximum RRSP** contribution is \$26,010 or 18% of earned income.

The **2017 Tax Free Savings Account** maximum contribution is \$5,500 with a cumulative maximum of \$52,000 plus repayment of any withdrawals.

Tax Tips from Court Carleton Accounting & Tax Services

If you have **Adoption expenses** they could be claimed for a tax credit.

If you have **infirmed dependants** under the age of 18 there is a Canada caregiver tax credit of \$2150 or if you have an infirmed dependant over the age of 18 the maximum is \$6883 depending on their income.

If you pay for **Student Loan**, interest payments are deductible, if never claimed you can go back five years.

If you have **donations** they can be claimed for a tax credit, if never claimed you can go back five years.

If you have **medical expenses** such as drugs, vision, dental and travel these expenses may be able to be claimed as a tax credit. In addition you may also qualify for

a medical expense supplement.

If you over contributed to **CPP or EI** through employment any excess amounts may be refunded in that year.

If you have working income from employment or business you may be able to claim **The Basic Working Income Tax Benefit** refund, for a single person the maximum is \$1043 and for a family the maximum is \$1894

If you are a teacher there is a **School Supply Benefit** of a maximum of \$1000









A Mistle Thrush Comes to Visit

"Why not make our species first visit to North America to Miramichi, New Brunswick. It looks like a welcoming place", says the Eurasian Mistle Thrush.

By December 9th 2017 it had made its way to a garden on Manny Dr. in the former town of Newcastle "why that's a nice English name, I will feel at home here I am sure" it may have thought.

Perhaps this was what was going through the mind of this bird as it arrived at what turned out to be its resting area for at least the next 5 ½ weeks at the time of writing. All is green, berries plentiful and all of the other birds, "eh, no problem".

Come December 10th "Uh Oh" it may have thought, ... the green grass had became covered in white and wintery weather arrived. The Mistle Thrush, not one to look back, was not deterred. "I am a tough little one" it demonstrated. And so it continued, through snow storms, severe wind chill, rain and wind, wild temperatures swings and all manner of precipitation, this thrush flourished and in the meantime delighted many visitors from near and far.

It has been seen daily in a four block area feeding on mountain ash berries, basking in the sun, preening, and standing guard over its food. Flocks of Bohemian Waxwing one hundred members strong, American Robins, and European Starlings have all found out that they are no match for this aggressive vagrant when they try to snatch berries from under its "nose". It seems that it knows there are some long winter days ahead before it can resume its normal foraging in grass and bushes for its balanced omnivore's diet. Berries will do in the meantime ... "and they are mine, all mine".

There have been 400 or more visiting birders who have come to see this lost thrush from 7 Canadian provinces and 22 American States. All have been very, very pleased when they have had a good look and all have been very, very grateful for the opportunity. Many knowledgeable birders go to great lengths in pursuing their interest in the beauty, uniqueness and behaviour of their quarry. To see a bird never previously seen on the North American continent adds another aspect. For quite a few visiting birders the Mistle

Thrush was around the 800th, if not the 800th, bird on their North American list and some have seen more that 900. In New Brunswick the records indicate that over many years, 386 species have been reported.

The Mistle Thrush is a little larger than an American Robin, heavily spotted on its chest and belly, essentially brown on its head and back but with white trim on its wing feathers and tail. It is not a brilliantly coloured bird but the word "handsome" applies. Its behaviour is interesting to watch.

Its normal range stretches from Scandinavia to Northern Africa and as far east as the western Himalayan Mountains. It has been reported in Iceland. So why is it here? Most likely it got caught up in a weather system in the North Atlantic in early fall and was carried west by wind currents. Some have said post-tropical storm Ophelia in mid-October 2017 might be responsible.

It is thought that as long as it has a good food supply (mountain ash berries — of which there is a good supply nearby) it is likely to get through winter. It has demonstrated good survival behaviour by usually having coniferous shelter nearby when it feeds, it protects its food supply as mentioned above, and avoids predators such as Sharp-shinned Hawks which it has encountered several times. Will it return to Europe? Probably not.

It is very much a welcomed visitor to our neighbourhood and a delightful representative of the wonders of nature.


With colour, shape, size and style to consider, choosing the perfect diamond ring can be a little overwhelming. Have no fear, we're here to help!



Miramichi Cross Country Ski Club By Deana Gadd

There's something for everyone at the Miramichi Cross Country Ski Club. Located in a wooded setting in the Nelson area of the city, the club offers a variety of activities. Some of the choices are snowshoeing on wooded trails with your camera in hand, a family ski that can include taking your toddler in a special pull along sled or going for a vigorous skate ski.

The ski club operates seven days a week, usually with a lodgekeeper present. Evenings see volunteers on duty to welcome skiers, keep the fire going and handle trail fees and rentals. The club has 4 km of brightly lit trails that are open from Monday to Saturday from dusk until 9:30 pm. There is a special night time rate of \$5 that includes a trail pass and rental equipment. The club has rental equipment for all ages for skis (free for ages 3 to 5) and youth and adult snowshoes. Skate skis are available at a higher rental rate and are only in larger sizes, you must have skied before to rent them.

The ski trails at the club range from a 0.3 km bunny trail to the 12 km silver trail. Some trails are wider and allow for both classic and skate skiing, while others are narrower and groomed only for classic skiing. The snowshoers have their own 6 km of trails which are laid out in 1km flagged loops.

The ski club has a youth skill development program which is already under way with an annual participation event on Feb. 4th (the Miramichi Ray Thibodeau Loppet) and social events planned during the year.

Cross country skiing and snowshoeing are easy ways to get fresh air and sunshine during the winter months. The ski club members welcome you to join us and find out for yourself!



Meet Unicare's Lisa Williams

A Social Entrepreneur with a Vision by Kellie Underhill

The house at 540 King George Highway in Newcastle, Miramichi bustles with activity. Passing through several office spaces on the ground floor, upstairs you'll find a large training room where people learn things like First Aid/ CPR and how to properly lift and transfer. This is also where you'll find the office of Lisa Williams, owner and operator of Unicare Home Health Care and Uniclean Solutions.

Petite, friendly, and down to earth, at first glance Lisa mightn't seem like a captain of industry but it doesn't take much conversation before you realize you are in the presence of a great business mogul. In 2018, Lisa's flagship company, Unicare celebrates a decade since she first started the business as a single mother in her living room. She started alone in a 12x12 room and now she employs over 200 people in five locations throughout the province with unlimited expansion still to come.

An educator first and foremost, before starting her businesses Lisa travelled the world, living and working abroad in places like China and the United Arab Emirates. As the regional manager for another company during its start-up phase she enjoyed seeing the business grow, problem solving and overcoming challenges in the company's infancy.

When the young mother returned home to Miramichi in 2007 she wasn't sure what to do next, until her father asked when

she had felt the most happy in her work life so far.

"And I said, actually when I was doing that home care business start-up," she recalls. "And he just looked at me and said, 'Well, why can't you do that?' And I was like yeah, why can't I do that! So then I had a goal. I was going to start my own business."

Running her own home health care business is something for which she has a real driving passion.

"I'm a social entrepreneur." Lisa says. "So I feel like with everything I do I'm helping society become better in some way. I'm helping either the clients that we serve or the caregivers in my employment."

Since starting Unicare, Lisa has helped to change the home health care industry. Educating caregivers and improving their quality of life by getting them better wages and things is a passion.

"I feel very good about what we do here everyday and I think every person here has a sense of accomplishment in helping people live a better quality of life."

In the industry's early days, caregivers weren't trained and a lot of people moved in and out. She estimates the turnover rate was anywhere from 35-40% across the industry. Unicare never had that high turnover. She believes it's been consistently around





20%, which is very good.

"It's getting better," she says. "Because now they are trained and now they feel more valued. They actually feel like they know what they're doing and it gives them a confidence."

In the beginning, a lot of caregivers were older and more experienced in the workforce. Now a lot of young people are training for a career in home health care.

"These young people coming in want to be trained. They're excited about being trained, excited about their work and they're staying. It's fantastic!"

Still, there's a lot of work to be done and Lisa's main goal is to change the industry. She has already been instrumental in helping to develop government standards but there's more to do.

better, because it's one of the highest

stress jobs. Even though I run this business I have never gone into that part of it, and I don't think I could ever do it. I have the utmost respect for people who can. If we did not have these people, we would not exist. I value everything they do. I want employees to know that, and that I have their backs. I'm a big supporter of my employees. And I just want them to know that we're always trying to do better for them."

Two years ago, there was no training. Now, training happens in English and French about three days a week in Miramichi and she's looking for another building, a kind of school, that will train not only her employees but anyone who wants to learn how to care for a loved one at home, or First Aid, CPR, WHIMIS and other courses.

Last year, Lisa also started Uniclean, a sister company to Unicare, which began with three cleaners and by mid-2017 employed 15. From residential to commercial, Uniclean was born out of Lisa's passion to help people.

"We developed Uniclean out of a need from Unicare clients

who wanted to have a bigger clean, a full spring clean or whatever. It's a perfect complement to that, but it's also more of a luxury too for people who work everyday, myself included. I promised myself when I started that if I was going to work all day, look after my son all day, I wasn't going to come home on the weekend and spend it cleaning."

Expansion is also happening. Unicare currently services five areas in New Brunswick - Miramichi. Acadian Peninsula, Campbellton and Moncton. They are expanding into Fredericton this year and Edmundston soon after. But Lisa's expansion vision doesn't end there.

"I see Unicare leaving the province. Maybe down to the States, maybe to Europe. There is no limit," she says. "I think my biggest need right now is labour. I need labour. And in the the next five years, I'm

going to need labour like you have no idea. I'm always hiring."

She estimates within the next few years this province won't have enough labour to fill the need.

"We need immigration. Because I need people." So in the next year or two, Lisa would like to do a Trade Mission with the government and explore the possibilities.

"There's so many opportunities. There's so much that needs to be improved. It's endless," she says. "I always thought big, I never thought there were any limits. My thing is always what can I change to make this place better, what can I change to make my parents more comfortable as they age, what can I change so that by the time I get there I am going to be able to reap the benefits of what we did here. I just want to change something to make things better."




