DICKISON'S PHARMASAVE®

Your Locally Owned and Operated Community Pharmacy Since 1921

CM Dickison & Sons, a well-known pharmacy throughout the Miramichi, was founded by Charles M Dickison in February 1921, after he operating another pharmacy since March 1910 with a business partner. In 1921 he had associated with his three sons, Albert, Roy and Charles D, all certified drug clerks. From 1921 to 1954 the business was carried on in the MacMIllian Block, Ellen Street. On October 21, 1954 they moved into their spacious new store on Henry Street one of the most up to date pharmacies in the province.



Dickison's Then

In 1924 the Dickison Drug Store at Doaktown was opened by Albert Dickison as manager until his death in 1953. Roy Dickison was with his father and brother in the Newcastle business until his sudden death in 1942. In 1953 a third generation joined the staff, Robert Dickison graduated from Maritime College of Pharmacy, affiliated with Dalhousie University. In 1953 Charles M Dickison retired after 67 years in active business and he passed away in April of the same year.

March 1967 brought a change in ownership to CM Dickison & Sons on Henry Street. Charles D Dickison, son of the founder of the firm, who has been associated with the store for 45 years sold the business to Jack Manderville and Frank Dickson. Both men have been members of the staff for 18 years, Jack as book keeper and Frank as certified drug clerk. CD Dickison remained at the store as a registered druggist. The business continued without change under the same name and with the same staff.

1987 brought another change in ownership to CM Dickison & Sons. Stan Knowles purchased the business from Jack Manderville and Frank Dickson. Stan Knowles graduated from Dalhousie University in 1974 with his Bachelor of Pharmacy. Stan joined the staff at CM Dickison in 1976. The business continued without change under the same name and with the same staff.

In 1988 Stan Knowles and his wife Jean opened a new pharmacy in Blackville. In 1994 Stan & Jean purchased Dickison's Drug Store in Doaktown, from Ian Dickison, son of

the late Albert Dickison. Renovations were completed to the Blackville location in 2001 and new store was built in Doaktown in 2005.

In 1994 fire gutted the Newcastle location on Henry Street. The fire was on April 1, 1994, Good Friday. A reporter with ATV first spotted the smoke coming from the top floor of the pharmacy. He notified the pharmacy and the upstairs tenants. Everyone safely evacuated the building. When the pharmacy staff was told their building was on fire it was 10 minutes before the top floor was engulfed in flames. The staff put everything in the safe, the backup tapes and computer discs. All the computer files were saved and the business was reopened the next day at the Wandlyn Inn. The estimated loss of the building and the stock was \$1.3 million. The store was rebuilt and opened in 1995.

In 2003 the next generation joined the staff of CM Dickison. Scott Knowles, Stan & Jean's son, graduated from Dalhouise University in 2007 and joined his father as a staff pharmacist. Scott was an active member of the staff and the community up to his sudden death in September 2011.

Katrina Donovan joined the store in 2010 as a professional accountant, business manager, and minority shareholder. Katrina's first job was at the Blackville store in 1991 as a student.

The Bathurst location was opened in September 2015.

2017 saw another change in ownership of the stores. Brian St Coeur and Katrina Donovan purchased the businesses from the Knowles family. Stan Knowles remains on staff at the Henry Street location to provide guidance. The business will continue without change under the same name and with the same staff.

Brian St Coeur has worked at the store since 2006, and became a full time pharmacist in 2012.

Although the ownership of the stores have changed several times since 1921 the store has continued to be a strong supporter of the community and dedicated to being the best community pharmacy. The customers and staff remain the most important part of the store. This philosophy has been passed down through the generation from 1921 to today.

Homecoming: A Road Less Travelled - Book Review by James M. Fisher

Miramichi author Wayne Curtis has a new collection of short stories entitled *Homecoming: A Road Less Travelled* (2017, Pottersfield Press).

The bulk of the stories centre around couples. Sean O'Reilly and Amy Black, and Floyd Harris and his wife Beverley. With exception of Beverly (who is from Massachusetts), all the principal characters in the stories are from the Miramichi. Their lives begin either on the farm or as in the case of Sean and Amy, an orphanage in Bradford (aka Newcastle).

There is a definite progression to each story, although it is not always chronological in order of events.

Reading a Wayne Curtis short story (or one of his many novels, for that matter) is a singular experience, one to be relished and not quickly dispensed with. The beauty of the short story format is the economy of any elaboration and how the author can make us envision places and characters in as few words as possible. While Mr Curtis is not a stark, "bare bones" style of writer, the wordage is sufficient for the ideas and thoughts to be conveyed in a comprehensive manner. Mr Curtis is an unquestionably masculine writer in the manner of David Adams Richards, but with a more resolute, nostalgic outlook on life and events.

These stories are from a time when downtown Newcastle was a bustling place, for it was the main shopping district of

the Miramichi in those days before the advent of local malls and highway driving to big box store and Costco. Travel was primarily by bus or train between the scattered communities

> for those not able to afford a car (or cars). "It [the train] was the link to fulfilling my dreams" says young Jack in "The Train"



Conclusion

These stories will likely be best appreciated by Miramichiers, but they have a timeless appeal as well, for relationships have not really changed from an internal perspective, only the

external forces have evolved, and all the old ones (money, mental illness, employment) are all still there too.

Homecoming may well be the best work to date of Mr Curtis, at least in this reviewer's estimation. Perhaps due to his age (he is in his mid-70's now) he has a more soulful and deeper intensity behind his thoughts. At any rate, Homecoming represents the best in the short story format from one of Canada's most underrated writers.

Electronic Screen Syndrome: The Learning and Behavioral Side Effects on Children by Brett Gallant, Adaptive Office Solutions

The unnaturally stimulating nature of a electronic screens — irrespective of the content —has ill effects in children and can present in many forms; namely mood, cognition, and behavior. The root of these symptoms appears to be linked to repeated stress on the nervous system, making self-regulation and stress management less efficient.

What's the result? Disorganized, disobedient, or oppositional thinking, over-excitement, delayed maturity, anti-social behavior, low frustration tolerance, poor short-term memory, dramatic mood swings, outbursts, tantrums, erratic behavior, addiction, and, eventually, sleep disturbances.

The lion-share of symptoms are completely preventable. How? With an "electronic fast." This is a four week period wherein all electronic media is off-limits. Odd recommendation, coming from an IT guy, but I've had personal experience with this experiment, and it works!

So which devices have a no-go rule during the electronic fast? TV's, computers, tablets, gaming consoles, e-readers, etc. Limit smart phones to calls and non-conversational texts. Some children can tolerate moderation after a fast, while others seem to relapse immediately if re-exposed.

How much electronic use can be reintroduced? The American Academy of Pediatrics recommends no more than 1-2 hours daily. But, how can you be sure (without being a helicopter parent) that they're adhering to the rules?

There's a nifty little gadget called Circle with Disney, a \$99 device that can monitor your family's online habits; seeing just how much Facebook, Minecraft, or YouTube they get access to in a day. Available online, it hooks up to your Wi-Fi router and monitors the activity of every device connected to your home network.

Limiting electronic stimulation has proven to: reduce aggression, create better/balanced moods, increase agreeability, improve grades, led to better social skills, promote healthy sleep patterns, and... produce happier, more relaxed parents.


What will your kids do with all that free time? Go back to basics, with: board games, crafts, cooking, gardening, building models, reading, drawing/painting, playing outside, take a walk or hike, go swimming, go to the library, visit local attractions, etc.

The more engaged your children are in non-electronic stimulation the less they will suffer the ill effects of Electronic Screen Syndrome. It's time to take back control



and set limits on activities that are proven to damage healthy emotional, intellectual and personal growth.

Do yourself a favour, and just say, "That's enough for today." In the end, they'll thank you for it.

Meet a Librarian: Dana Horrocks

Dana Horrocks is the Newcastle Public Library's new Director and since a librarian is practically every book lover's favourite person, I thought it would be interesting to get to know one better. Dana gladly agreed to be interviewed by The Miramichi Reader.

First, give us a little background. You've only been in the Miramichi a short time, so we would like to know more not only about you but about the road you chose to be where you are now.

I was born and raised a few minutes walk from the beach in Surrey, BC. Thanks to my adventurous parents I was lucky enough to spend three years of my childhood living in Brunei, a small Muslim country in Southeast Asia. Upon

graduating the only undergraduate program which interested me was called Renaissance College (a Bachelor's Degree in Interdisciplinary Leadership Studies) which would take me to far away Fredericton. I enjoyed my time there, playing varsity soccer and pursuing courses in creative writing and economics. After graduating I bounced back and forth between coasts- doing an internship at 826 Boston (a non-profit after-school creative writing program for kids), working at Vancouver Kidsbooks (one of Canada's largest independent children's bookstores) and teaching English for a year in Kedgwick (as part of the Odyssey Program.) It was through these pursuits that I discovered the idea of librarianship and so from a snowy Kedgwick, NB I applied to UBC's Master of Library and Information Studies program, and was thrilled to get in. I focused my courses on

public library service and working with children, youth and families. After graduating I worked as an On-Call Librarian at the Vancouver Public Library for two years before securing a permanent position. I worked at a busy, urban branch for another 2 years before following my partner back across the country to the Miramichi- where lo and behold there was a job opening for a new librarian!

Favourite book(s) or one that you like to revisit from time to time: As a teenager I would re-read all the Harry Potter books before the next one would come out, as an annual ritual, however these days I very rarely return to something I've already read. The one exception would be poetry – I have a

small collection of poetry books which I will revisit when the mood strikes. I certainly have favourite kinds of books, books that feel like a treat, and they are picture books and graphic novels. Books to be savoured!

Can you recall at what point you decided (or thought about) becoming a librarian? Is librarian even the correct term these days? Obviously, it all started with a book. I don't know how I heard about it but I read This Book Is Overdue!: How Librarians and Cybrarians Can Save Us All by Marilyn Johnson while I was living in Kedgwick and was blown away. Here was a career where you could advocate for and be part of an organization that upholds the most democratic of values, like access to information and protection of privacy, AND be surrounded by readers and

reading all day long. I could combine my love of children's literature, supporting literacy and the public policy and leadership I studied Renaissance College. The term librarian is correct, however as libraries across the country employ paraprofessionals to do work which used to be a librarian's

Building a Corn Maze Business

A Dream Come True for the Fletcher Family by John Fletcher



The idea to build a Corn Maze in Nelson (Miramichi) was planted in my head close to a decade ago. I had seen a

maze online and was fascinated by the idea. However, the seed laid dormant as my wife and me - like many other Miramichi'ers- moved away from home in pursuit of employment. We had moved a lot over the years, and we finally settled - we thought- in Fort McMurray, Alberta in 2014.

On May 4th, 2016 our lives changed forever. Natalie and I, and our two children, Kellan and Kylie, were part of the city-wide evacuation in Fort McMurray due to the dangerous forest fires. As hectic as it was, it was the beginning of a new journey for the Fletcher family. While we were in Miramichi waiting for the green light to

go back to Fort McMurray we had some time to reevaluate our living situation. Natalie and I had been away from the river since we graduated high school in 2003 and had always longed for the day we could "come home" for good. We tied up some loose ends out west and put a plan in action to

relocate to the Mighty Miramichi. The Fletchers' were finally coming home.

Once our feet were rooted back in Miramichi, I started seriously thinking about creating a Corn Maze business. The seed that laid dormant for all those years began to come to life. I embarked on a mission to know everything there was to know about operating a corn maze attraction. I read books, listened to podcasts, watched hours upon hours of videos on youtube and consulted with some of the first corn maze business owners in North America. My thirst for knowledge was unquenchable.

Entrepreneurialism, agriculture, and ecotourism run in my blood. My grandfather Benedict (Benny) Fletcher use to pedal fresh vegetables door-to-

door in Nelson (Miramichi). My father and grandfather operated a Christmas Tree U-Pick in Nelson when I was in elementary, and my father and mother have been running Fletcher's Sleigh Rides for over two decades. The Corn Maze, in a way, was the proverbial "handing of the torch"

from one generation to the next.

When choosing a theme and design for our maze for our inaugural year, we wanted to do something to give back to the region that gave us so much growing up. We chose the Miramichi City Logo and "Discover Miramichi" as our design; however, we didn't stop there. **Our in-maze scavenger hunt**, which has 18 checkpoints, features writeups and skill testing questions about Miramichi festivals, events, tourist attractions and historic sites. We wanted to showcase the great things there is to do and be part of here on the Miramichi.

Our kids maze takes approximately 20 minutes to complete. We also have a fun park that has a hay bale pyramid with two giant tunnel slides, tetherball stations, a corn box (think sandbox but with corn), tireland, a small toddler hay bale maze and we offer wagon rides that take you around the property and through part of the cornfield.

To say that our family is excited about this new venture would be a gross understatement. Being able to settle in Miramichi, continuing to grow our family (adding Khloe in May 2018), and opening a business that offers an experiential and educational experience for all ages is indeed a dream come true.



At the time of this publication Hospice Miramichi will be in the process of constructing a six bed Residential Hospice Facility on the Gordon Rd. This facility will provide 24 hour care delivered by palliative trained professional staff to individuals with a life expectancy of 3 months or less who for whatever reason are unable to remain at home to receive their end of life care but do not want to go to the hospital. Even though the provincial government has committed funding to offset the expenses associated with direct patient care Hospice Miramichi will still need to fundraise to cover the expenses associated with programming and non-patient related costs.






