Engineering



The City of Miramichi, in partnership with the New Brunswick Department of Transportation and Infrastructure is undertaking upgrades to the following intersections along King George Highway (KGH); Newcastle Boulevard, George Street and Jane Street.

The majority of the work will take place at Newcastle Boulevard where new underground infrastructure will be installed as well as new traffic islands and lights. George Street will have the traffic lights replaced, and at Jane Street, traffic islands and lights will be installed on the south side of KGH. Traffic will be detoured as per the following from approximately May 15th to July 30th:

- West bound KGH traffic will continue to use KGH
- Eastbound KGH traffic will be detoured at Jane Street to Newcastle Blvd to Ledden St.
- Southbound Newcastle Blvd. traffic will be directed to Station St.or Railway Ave.
- Northbound Newcastle Blvd traffic from downtown will be directed east or west along Pleasant Street.

Public Works - Some helpful hints for upcoming spring thaw:

- Adopt a fire hydrant that may be close to your house, it may save you or your neighbors home.
- If a catch basin is located close to your property and you experience flooding, keep it clear.
- When removing snow from your property, avoid large banks at the end of your driveway. It creates poor visibility for you.
- Do not place snow from your driveway on the street. This is safety hazards for the motoring public and fine is possible.
- During stormy conditions please follow police advisories and stay off the road unless it is an emergency.
- Be prepared for spring thaw, check your basement drains to ensure they are clear and not frozen due to the recent winter freeze thaw cycles.
- Check your sub pump to be sure it is working properly.
- Check your rain gutter to ensure it is are not frozen and excess build up of ice on your roof.
- Make sure your basement windows are cleared of snow and have access to drain away from your house.
- Check ditches located in front or next to your home make sure they can run free without obstructions.

BPSA Traditional Scouting invites Miramichi youth, parents and volunteers to discover the magic of the great outdoors. This fresher, yet traditional scouting program is affordable, open, inclusive to boys and girls and centered around outdoor programs and activities.

October 2019 marked the beginning of a back to basics scouting group in Miramichi — the 1st Miramichi BPSA Scouting Group. They are open to boys and girls who appreciate outdoor activities, such as exploring, canoeing, hiking, and camping.

Attributes of good character become part of the youth as they learn to work together to face outdoor challenges that may include extreme weather, difficult trails, hiking obstacles, and dealing with nature's unexpected circumstances.

The aim of the association is to promote good citizenship and wholesome physical and mental development with training in observation, discipline, self-reliance, loyalty, and useful life skills.

Service to others and good community is also learned through outdoor activities such as conservation projects, collecting food, building trails



and shelters, and conducting community service projects that promote healthy living. Through helping others, scouting youth learn to complete challenges they first thought were beyond their ability.

BPSA-NB believes that true traditional scouting should be affordable. Therefore, the annual registration fee is only \$55, plus the cost of uniforms and youth can try two meetings for free. For Otters (ages 5 - 7) and Timberwolves (ages 8 - 10), the cap and long-sleeved t-shirt cost \$15. For Explorers (ages 11 - 15), Sr Explorers and Adults, the beret and tan short-sleeved button-up shirt is \$35. There may be additional costs associated with camps and other outings, but they will be kept to a bare minimum.

This group is growing rapidly and in need of more leaders and auxiliary support. We urge you to reach out and become a part of the 1st Miramichi BPSA Scouting Group.

Over the Hills and Far Away

I've heard it said that some of your memories may not be real. That they contain fragments of your imagination. If this is true, then that would explain those aliens and monsters of my memories. These little stories are my memories. Yours may differ.

Sometimes I try to imagine kids of today doing half the things we did. First, would they even be allowed, second could they be pried away from the internet and video games. Not all but some.

Case in point, we were fans of the Canadian show, The Forest Rangers. Of course we acted out what the kids did on that show, or tried to. Picture this, age 8 or 9, you ask your mother to wake you early in the morning - in the summer - no school! Why? Because you and your gang are planning a trip to the woods to work on an old log cabin and you needed her to pack you a lunch.

We made our plans the day before and that each one of us would bring a specific tool required for work on said camp. I was in charge of the hammer, Chris, the saw, Darren, the axe, Dennis with some wood. My younger brother of two years Dwayne would also tag along and bring the nails. Chris's dog Chopper would also be joining us, as he was always around and free to roam the neighborhood.

With backpacks filled with tools,



lunches, water canteens and jack knives (Swiss Army ones, perhaps), off we would go across the street and thru the field following a well worn path that lead to an area of trees we called the "Jungle". But today we are going past this area. We would need to climb up the embankment to the railway tracks that would lead us to our adventure of the day.

The reflection of the sun beaming from the rails added to the summer heat. It was so hot that a haze would rise from the tracks distorting your view like a mirage. The smell of creosote from the railway ties along with the clicking sounds of grasshoppers, which seem to everywhere along the tracks, would add to the atmosphere that stays with me to this day.

The walk along the tracks would not be long until we would make a detour to the 'Y". This is a section of rail tracks that is shaped as; you guessed it the letter Y, used in the early days when a train engine would change directions. Having never been used in years, this section of track was rusty, so no sun beams to make it hotter. Grass and large weeds have grown up all over and we would often come here to catch Gardner and grass snakes, but not today, we must go beyond. This meant climbing a high cliff at the end of the Y. Once at the top, we made our way along a tree line that separated a large field. To get to this field, we would have to navigate thru the trees and over an old barbed wire fence, which no doubt left some scratches or cuts. But we are rangers and must take any punishment along the way and keep treading.

Having never been past the Y before, reaching the field on the other



side of the tree line was very exciting. Another world. This new world would be Park's Field, owned by the same people who ran and still do a popular ice cream stand on the King George Highway. One of us, I am not sure who, knew how to get to the cabin, and as I was told was built by our older brothers and now left to us.

Here we are, walking along another path that followed the tree line and I am being told to keep an eye out for foxes, weasels, rabbits and maybe... bear. Bears?! I thought, ok I am not walking last



in line, let my younger brother be eaten I don't care, he can be last. But they said not to worry, Chopper is with us and can fight any animal off. That eased my frightened mind somewhat. But we never did see any bears, or any other wild life for that matter expect for a few crows and blue jays. So we would not get lost in the woods, we knew to mark the trees by scaling the bark with a knife. The path seemed to take forever, but we finally reached its end and onto an old road. Not really a road per say, as it was made with years of truck tire tracks that lead to The Beaver Dam. That is a story for another time.

We did not walk too long on the road until I heard, "right here" being shouted by whoever was up at the front. At this point we would have to make our way thru the thick forest of trees of all kinds to the cabin. After a few more scratches from getting whipped by tree branches, adding to the ones of the barbed wire fence at Park's field, we could now see a clearing up ahead. "Are we here"? I thought with excitement. Yes, we were.

And there it was, a small cabin made out of logs no bigger round than my arms. Laying down our back packs, we all entered the opening (no door) that lead inside. With large smiles and exhausted wows, we sat and marveled at the sight, and smells that surrounded us. But we had much to do, the cabin needed repairs and that is why we were here. Someone made a camp fire (imagine that for a moment), and each of us had a job to do, either cutting down small trees, gathering twigs or collecting moss. The moss would be jammed between the logs for insulation. So while some of us were doing that, another would be hammering nails into the small pieces of wood on the flat roof.

After much work, it was time to eat our packed lunches. And how we knew it was lunch time was the sound of a horn blowing from the pulp mill located at the other end of town. The horn we

knew would blow at noon every day, and that the sound carried all over the town. Once lunch was over it was back to work until it was decided we had better head back home. We had to put the fire out before leaving - you will have to use your imagination as to how young boys put out a fire. Exactly.

The walk back did not seem as long as getting there, but I will treasure this memory forever. We all did eventually join boy scouts clubs, some until our teens and we made other trips to our "playground" of fields and forest close to home. I don't remember if we ever went back to the cabin, but I know as we got a couple of years older, we were finally allowed to go further down the old road on a new adventure, to the Beaver Dam.





Miramichi Historical Society 61 Years of Preserving History



Louise Manny, McGill Graduation Portrait (1989.108.203) New Brunswick Museum – Musée du Nouveau-Brunswick, www.nbm-mnb.ca The Miramichi Historical Society was organized in 1959 with 21 charter members. Their mission was to collect and organize the history of the Miramichi, to aid researchers of history and to present programs to the public on Miramichi historical events and people. Dr. Louise Manny and Edith MacAlllister, both noted local historians and writers were on the list of founding members.

Today, 61 years later the mission remains the same - to collect, organize and disseminate the history of the Miramichi. Over the years, membership has waxed and waned but the Society is still going and still working to accumulate knowledge of our beautiful Miramichi. A significant bank of cultural and historical records has been built up over time. These extensive files, which are housed and maintained in the Newcastle Public Library, are open to all interested and must be used on site. They are not available for borrowing from the library.

The Society meets 6 to 8 times a year. Sometimes there is a guest speaker, sometimes a general sharing of items of interest among those present; perhaps a photo, an article, an intriguing historical fact or an artifact. Questions are asked and answered and mysteries solved. There is always something new to be learned and shared.

Some of the programs in the past few years have included talks by members and guest speakers. Topics included Peter Mitchell, the Miramichi lumber industry, the North Shore Regiment, Vimy and Normandy, Father Murdock, Dr.Louise Manny, Beaubear's Island, the




Provincial Archives Miller Photograph collection, the restoration of the New Brunswick portage system, and a talk by Dr. Stephen Patterson of UNB on the rebuilding of NB after the Miramichi Fire of 1825. William Murray of Miramichi was an important builder of that period. Last winter, Gary Hughes, curator of history at the New Brunswick Museum, gave an interesting presentation on the life of Dr. Louise Manny. The latest talk was about Sheldrake Island and its associations with leprosy in the 1800's.

Members visited St. Paul's Anglican Church in Bushville and St. James and St. John United Church in Newcastle and their graveyards, the Miramichi History Museum, took walking tours of Chatham and Newcastle, visited the old school in Oak Point and took several river trips on the Max Aitken. The Society also supports enrichment projects related to our history undertaken by students of the area and the District Heritage Fair with an award for research related to the Miramichi. The Society also has developed a close association with the Miramichi History Museum in support of our common interest in the Miramichi and its history.

Remembering the Church River Credit Union

A few years ago, on a crisp fall day, I went out for an afternoon drive down to a little community on the outskirts of Miramichi, know as Church River, which is situated towards the Burnt Church Community / Esgenoôpetitj 1st Nation.

This wasn't just a drive to take in the fall scenery, but the person I was travelling with was heading to the Church River Credit Union.

For as long as I remember, the

only banks I thought were close by were the Caissie Populaire Acadiennes (now UNI Financial Cooperations) in Néguac and the surrounding areas along the Acadian Peninsula and so on.

But this wasn't like your everyday bank you see in the city, town or village, or wherever you may live. This bank was a tiny little building, no bigger than your average shed or baby barn and was located at 305 Burnt Church Road.

It had no bank cards, no cheques, no automated teller

personalized service.



Well Isn't that Interesting...



This convertible high chair/stroller is just one of the interesting pieces of history on display at Beaubears Island Interpretive Centre

This is an example of late Victorian and early Edwardian furniture from around the dawn of the 20th century. The high chair/stroller combo is a multipurpose object indicative of that era.

The chair converts into a complete stroller and would have been used to not only feed the child but also allow the parent to wheel the child around the house. The wheels are not really sturdy enough for outdoor use, and as such would have been used only indoors. Advertisements for this type of chair were seen as early as the 1880s. It should be noted that,

the attractive design seen on the back of this piece were pressed into the wood using heat, steam and a mould. There was no hand-carving done, and this chair is related to the millions of so-called "pressed-back" chairs.




