



#### I am an Old Soul with Good Bones

#### An Old Building Writes from the Heart

I am an old soul.

I started out as a **country store** built in 1896 and run by Mr. & Mrs. British Nathaniel Underhill in the small community of **Barnettville NB**. I stood by a railway station where the Whooper train came and brought supplies for me, and bags of mail for the community.

People also travelled from Newcastle up to Barnettville on this train, visiting relatives who greeted them with hugs and smiles.

I carried the necessities, as every good store does. In the cellar I had barrels of molasses, and 100 lb sacks of flour and sugar which were weighed out on scales and sold by the pound. The shoppers would come with their containers from home, to fill with molasses. Baskets of apples and oranges sat on the counter tops, and we sold butter, yeast, salt pork, corned beef, beans, raisins, lamp oil, soap, rabbit wire, school supplies, chocolates, and hard candy – to name a few. Back then most everyone had a garden for their vegetables, and cows and chickens for their fresh eggs and milk.

My how I came to life when they all arrived to shop for supplies and stayed to share stories of their fishing trips and talk about how their vegetable gardens were growing. The ladies would buy yarn and knitting needles and pretty material for dresses and aprons. I listened as they talked about church and their sewing projects and how many pairs of socks they would knit for their children for Christmas. My walls still hold the whispers of their laughs and conversations.

Those were good days.

Years went by and then Mr. Neil Crawford bought me in the 1970's and I served the community as a **post office**. The lovely Crawford family built a house attached to me and lived there until the late 80's, until the road needed to be widened and I had to be sold and moved. But I was not worried. I stood strong, and waited.

Then, Darlene Jardine who takes care of me now, bought me and the house for one dollar. She saw the value in me right away and knew I had good bones. For a few years I stored wood and was used for

tying Christmas wreaths. Oh how I loved the smell of the fir boughs!

One day Darlene had an idea. Or was it my idea... I can't be sure. She had a dream to start a **Tea House Restaurant and bakery** and before long I was shined up and filled with the smell of fresh baked bread and apple

dumplings. I was delighted to once again be welcoming in the community.

For 16 years I served as a restaurant. People from all over the world crossed through my doors. They came from Scotland, Germany, England, Switzerland, Spain, Italy and all across North America to have a home-cooked meal before continuing



on their travels. Many returned year after year, especially the fishermen, and those with summer homes in the area and we made a lot of friends. Locals celebrated their anniversaries and birthdays here, and we hosted fancy tea parties with music in the garden, Christmas dinners and a wedding. I'd listen with pride as Darlene served customers and told them my story, pointing out where the old store counter used to be and praising the original woodwork on my floors, walls and ceilings.

**Today I am living a new life once again,** this time as a cottage for rent on AirBnb. Years ago, an extension was built on for a dining room, and now that has been converted into bedrooms for guests. For the past couple of years people from all over Canada, and the world have been coming to

visit and enjoy my hospitality. I send a little warmth and comfort home with every guest who stays here, and they say they love my "rustic vibe". They know I am an old soul.

So here I am, old and rustic, still standing, strong and warm, with many years of memories within my walls, and many more to come.

# Monarch Butterflies Visiting Miramichi

Monarchs (Danaus plexippus) are often found in the Miramichi region through the summer months as well as most of the rest of southern Canada. They are easy to pick out with their bright orange wings with black veins, floating and flying easily even in the strongest of breezes. We should welcome these visitors because that is exactly what they are. They are one of a handful of butterfly species that migrate north every year. They are not able to survive as eggs, larvae (caterpillars) or adults in our cold winter conditions. The adults need an ambient air temperature of at least 13 C to fly!

Amongst the largest of our butterflies, they are probably one of the best known and they are hard to miss as they travel from flower to flower of native plants drinking up nectar to power their wing muscles and support their bodily functions. They can be confused at times with the very similar but smaller non-migratory viceroy butterfly which in its various life cycle stages is able to live here all year around. Like all insects the monarch has six legs but only four are easily seen.

In fall, the adult monarch carries out an amazing feat of endurance. Adults that emerge from their chrysalis

(cocoon) in late August and early September embark on a southerly trip of several thousand kilometers, most ending up in central Mexico to a small highland location. There, they roost by the millions for three months or so before starting the return northern journey in March. It is at this point that this late summer population reaches reproductive maturity and before travelling too far north, will produce the next generation of monarchs that will continue the northern migration. The reproductive cycle happens

approximately two or three more times, taking about a month to complete, before adult Monarchs reach southern Canada by late June or July. Adults seen at this time are the great, great grandchildren of the individuals that headed south the previous fall!

Once the northern migration begins, the adult monarchs live only for two to five weeks, unlike the southward traveling migrant that can live for seven or eight months. The adult female, attracted to milkweed plants, can lay between several hundred to more than a

thousand individual eggs. The normal survival rate, despite its defensive mechanism is about 10% however. There are two North American populations, separated by the Rocky Mountains. Our eastern population is by far the larger.

The monarch butterfly is considered a species at risk. Threats to its survival include industrial agricultural practices, herbicide and pesticide use, habitat destruction and climate change. Although they will feed on the flowers of most native plants its caterpillars hatch from small cream-coloured egg, laid individually on the underside of a young milkweed leaf, as the milkweed leaf is the only plant it on which it can survive.

As the caterpillar continues to eat milkweed leaves over the next 2 weeks or so it will undergo five molts, maturing physically each time. Finally, as a large black, yellow, and white striped caterpillar it will find a safe camouflaged spot away from its host plant, milkweed, to establish its chrysalis, emerging about 14 days later as a fully formed adult.

We can help the monarch survive by preserving suitable habitat including the planting of milkweed which is easy to grow. Here in Miramichi the two suitable varieties are **Common and Swamp Milkweed**, the latter in particular is an attractive garden plant.

The milkweed consumed by the caterpillar provides it with a toxin (cardenolides) that make it unpalatable to many of its possible predators. This toxin remains with the individual for life. It seems that this defensive mechanism is well known in the natural world and the monarch can afford to be large and "showy". In fact, the previously mentioned similar looking viceroy butterfly survives because it mimics the monarch and thus fools some of its predators.

The monarch's flight is described as slow and sailing, travelling about 9 km an hour, stopping to feed and rest along the way as it migrates. It navigates southward by instinct and relies on the polarizing characteristics of natural light. When

we see a freshly emerged monarch (not worn or damaged) in the late summer one can admire this super generation and wish it well on the long journey ahead.

#### Breathing New Life into the Old Courthouse

May 1, 2017: I am visiting Miramichi for the first time. I am a director of the Beaverbrook Canadian Foundation, set up by Lord Beaverbrook in the early 1960's, and have come to visit the Queen Elizabeth Park downtown. It was given to Lord Beaverbrook in the 1950's, he gave it to Lady Beaverbrook who then gave it to the



foundation. As a result of that visit we now have an agreement with the city - we own it, they operate it and insure it.

Mayor Lordon drove me to visit Beaverbrook House, and on the way I saw a large for sale sign on the old courthouse on King George Highway, which had been vacant for about 15 years. We stopped to visit. I was enthralled with the possibilities. I came back a couple of weeks later with my interior architect partner, Roberto Menegati. Several months later in winter 2018, Roberto and I became owners of this gorgeous piece of Miramichi history.

Cleaning up the interior mess while preserving as much as

possible of the original features of the old courthouse was a herculean task. We hired the heads of three Syrian refugee families to do this and help them out. They were great. Dozens of dumpsters were filled.

Local architect/engineers, general contractors, electricians, plumbers, roofers, painting contractors, -you name them, we hired them! Incredible help was







The Old Courthouse on King George Highway has just completed a multi-year total designer renovation, and now boasts 8 one and two bedroom luxury apartments and loft as well as 4 offices. A very small number of apartments and offices are still available for immediate or future rental.

All apartments feature luxury designer kitchens and high-end appliances, including washers/dryers, and are all fully climate controlled. They vary in size between 600 and 1430 square feet, while the offices are approximately 375 square feet each. Parking is included in the rent as are basement lockers for the apartments. There is an elevator. All the wiring, plumbing, insulation, heating and a/c is new, but many of the original design features such as the turrets, woodwork, floors, high ceilings and large windows remain. Even the corridors, featuring pictures of Old Miramichi, are a pleasure to use, and they reflect the high quality of design that has been incorporated throughout the Old Courthouse.

The views are amazing from many of the apartments in this heritage building.


welcomingly received from Brian Morris at Allied Realty who, against his own possible gain, suggested we rent the units when finished, rather than sell them as condos. Norman Roy of Roy Bros, the contractor, was there day and night and gave invaluable advice to ensure the huge cost overruns were minimized. Every single window and all the wiring and piping was replaced. As much of the gorgeous woodwork was retained as possible. So too the old safes - one is now the mail room, another safe door is hanging on a wall. The apartment entrances are painted to resemble the safe doors. The old prison bars from the cell adorns the main entrance.

Bit by bit the building was transformed into eight, one- and two-bedroom apartments, each one unique, one a loft, and four unique offices. Even an elevator was installed.

Endless permits had to be sought and rules and regulations followed - and finally all was finished, and the first tenants moved in in early February.

No one believed we would actually go ahead, but we did, and the result is truly outstanding. Each unit has features from the original courthouse - in one unit the door to the bathroom is the interior safe door from one of the safes. The turrets create warm and unique living space. Each kitchen has top of line appliances in a slate stainless steel finish. The corridors are graced by dozens of historic old photos of the courthouse and of old Newcastle and Chatham. A new parking area has sufficient space for tenants' and guests' cars.

The chance passing by 4 ½ years ago has really led to the rebirth of a beautiful and historic part of Miramichi and I am proud to have made this possible. This is however not my only connection with the beautiful Province of New Brunswick - I live most of the year in Montreal, but in 1995 I purchased the former home in St. Andrews of Lady Beaverbrook, which I first lived in and then turned into a museum for the works of art painted by my mother, Eva Prager O.C. and my grandfather, Joseph Oppenheimer. Apart from 300 paintings there is jewelry, hundreds of toys, interesting memorabilia, classic cars - including the Land Rover Lady Beaverbrook [who was then Lady Dunn] bought for Sir James Dunn in 1956. And of course the house itself! Please come and visit if you are in St. Andrews. We love welcoming Miramichiers. I've made the trip dozens of times back and forth over the last 3 years - it's easy! #### Miramichi Senior Sawdustmakers Inc Women Wood Carvers

At the Miramichi Senior Sawdustmakers Inc. (MSSI), we have been keeping our creative spirit alive.

In addition to the morning workshop period, we added carving classes in the afternoon, to give more people access to the shop and offer an opportunity for members to develop new skills. These classes were held every Thursday afternoon until June 30, the shop closure date for the summer.

Since the founding of MSSI, women have played an important role in the group. Here is a **profile of three women who joined the carving classes** with no prior carving experience but were eager to learn.

Rose wanted to carve a sign for a notfor-profit organization in PEI that she is involved with, collecting donations for a project in Ethiopia Africa. She had no prior experience in carving. After following the introductory course, understanding the basic concept of carving with the grain, how to use a gouge and practicing on the letter R, she embarked on the desired sign. While being



coached by carving instructor Philippe Gauthier, sanding and painting, she produced her first ever sign. She was so pleased with the experience that she carved a cat for one of her grand children.

Luce also had no experience with carving. She is a master at building small intricate wooden boxes and wanted to add a certain finesse to her multiple projects. She too followed the carving class courses and developed a unique technique of using the specialized



carving gouges and a Dremel grinder. She was extremely at ease

with the miniature router bits since she was a dentist in a prior life. She loves the buzzing sound of the Dremel. Her skill enables her to make very fine detailed elements to add to the boxes like the above maple leaf. Her approach opened the class to new carving techniques and possibilities.

Using the proper technique, she enthusiastically went for a project that she never thought she could do: a dragon. As always while carving wood, it takes patience determination. This combined with gentle coaxing by Philippe, and wood chip by wood chip removal, led to the final

creation of Spitfire the Dragon. At first, Daphne called it Spot, but after adding the fire breath that was not part of the original design, the name came naturally. Notice that the fire breath was designed with yellow, red, and blue stained glass incorporated into the wood, a first at MSSI. After 80 hours of work, the finished product is simply outstanding. What's next Daphne?

**Teresa** « **AKA the Director** » The youngest female Team Leader in MGSAR, she knows how to support, direct and focus her teammates during chaotic and complex situations.

While many people may feel the role of a searcher is primarily for men, that is not how it is with Miramichi Ground Search and Rescue. Women are able to fill role everv outnumber the men. I have been a member for almost three years and am eager to learn



more. Training has covered a broad range of topics held indoors and outdoors and all activities have improved my search skills. The search types I have participated in have been just as broad and have tested my physical and mental limits. Knowing my personal limits is important. I don't want



to become a distraction to my teammates on a search. The outcome of the searches has varied but helping others is rewarding. The support is always positive and encouraging and the friendships created are a wonderful bonus.

**Dianne** « **AKA** the **Queen Bee** » Give her a task to accomplish and it will be done efficiently, professionally and quickly no matter how difficult, complicated or arduous it is.

I had thought about joining the MGSAR but I wasn't sure if I would be a good candidate. I have a son with Autism who used to wander as a child; I am in a leadership role in my full-time job; and I stay active by hiking, walking, running, spinning, and paddle-boarding. I love nature but I don't go deep off-trail into the woods for fun. The turning point for



me was when I was on vacation in 2018. A woman my age had gone missing while out hiking and, at the time, I wished I had the experience to help search. Thankfully, she was later found alive by a group of experienced volunteers after 17 days in the woods. I met the MGSAR team at a family fun day event and I decided to try it out. Since then, this diverse group has taught me all about using maps, compasses, and GPS. I have participated in two mock searches and five searches and I love being able to help my community when needed.

**Chantal « AKA the Whisperer »** A recruit for only three months, it took her 17 minutes on a search to find a person suffering from dementia lost in the woods for two days. Her voice compelled the person to answer and come out of their hiding place.

MGSAR has been the most rewarding volunteer experience. Upon relocating to the Miramichi and reading an article in the Giv'er magazine I knew this was an all-

encompassing opportunity I wished to dedicate my time towards. MGSAR provides me with a sense of purpose, pride, genuine connection to our community, invaluable skills and endless personal growth opportunities both physical and




