Today I heard your sweet Bubbly song coming from The Boreal tree tops. The whole group was Resting after major foraging.


I saw the evidence of the Feeding frenzy – little

Three Dog Distilling - 1 Year Anniversary

This November, Three Dog Distilling Company will celebrate its first anniversary of being open. Owners Cheryl Brown and Francis Malley opened their doors to the public on October 31, 2020.

Why open a distillery? Well, many circumstances aligned, and they decided opening a distillery would be

perfect solution. Cheryl had retired after 35+ years with the federal government and interested in pursuing something entirely different and challenging. Francis had enjoyed making wine and beer as a hobby and had developed a great admiration and respect for Irish whiskeys. They have toured most of Ireland's distilleries and

enjoyed the joyful atmosphere of many of their pubs. Where Francis is an architect, why not use their experiences to design a distillery and incorporate all the necessary components: a boutique; a "pub" (Tasting Room); and a working distillery.

Once they decided to start on this adventure in 2018, there was a plan. They would begin with a small still, producing test spirits and if this went well, they would move on. The second step involved doing research and

development in small batches on a 100L still; again, this being successful, they made the decision to proceed. Before moving to the construction of a purpose-built craft distillery, it was essential to understand the processes, the functions of the equipment, and the regulations and licenses involved.

In June 2020, construction finished



on the distillery portion of the building, which meant that they would move to full production to prepare for opening in fall 2020. Focus quickly changed from research and development to fullscale production by adding a 500L pot still and a 500L hybrid still to their inventory.

When their doors opened a year ago, they started with five products for sale. Over the past year, they have added thirteen additional, and many more are in the works. Currently, the product list includes vodkas, flavoured vodkas (Apple Pie, Bog Juice, Lemonade and Wayerton Thunder), rums, gins and Durty Dog spirits (similar to whiskeys). Francis is quick to elaborate that he is always learning and improving the processes/techniques and exploring new products.

In July 2021, the distillery took

another big step and opened The Durty Dog, a 50 pub-style, seat. community gathering place, and eventually a tasting room catering to the tourism industry. The room is also being used for public and private events with live music almost every weekend.

Currently, Three Dog Distilling Company has seven part-time employees

and one full-time. As their plans unfold and we all return to a more normal existence, the distillery will continue to grow.

The William Murray Project Miramichi Historical Society

As we drive or walk around Miramichi, we pass by pieces of history. These sites have stories to tell if we take the time to listen, and give us a sense of place, and a sense of our roots. For the past year, we have been engaged in a project that aims to **tell the stories of a remarkable Scottish immigrant** who came to Miramichi over 200 years ago, and who has left us a legacy in wood and stone that lives on, giving us a vision of his talent and excellent craftsmanship.

The project is in three parts: firstly, we were asked to write an article about William Murray for the Borders Family History Society Magazine which publishes out of Scotland, in the Peeblesshire area where Murray was born. The editor felt their readers would be interested in the story of the young man from Peeblesshire who emigrated to the Miramichi area and left such a mark. The article was published in June 2021.


The second part of our project was to highlight six important buildings that were designed and built by Murray in Miramichi. The result is

the tourist booklet: William Murray: Miramichi's Master Builder' produced by the Miramichi Historical Society. It will be available at the two Visitors' Centres, both Public Libraries, Historic Beaverbrook House, Beaubear's Island, Middle Island, the Miramichi Natural History Museum, St. Paul's Anglican church, and St. Peter's and St. Paul's church, Wilson's Point, and St. Michael's Museum and Genealogical Centre.

The six buildings highlighted are:

- Murray Cottage (located at Ritchie Wharf Municipal Park)
- St. James & St. John church (King George Highway)
- Old Northumberland County Courthouse (Campbell Street)
- St. Paul's Anglican Church (Bushville)
- Judge Peters' Home (Miramichi Golf and Country Club, Bushville)
- St. Peter's and St. Paul's Roman Catholic Church, Bartibog Bridge

The booklet also acknowledges the work of the Highland Society of New Brunswick at Miramichi, an organization to which Murray belonged



in its earliest days. We continue to work on the history of Murray's life and work in Miramichi, and hope to have a book produced in the next year.

Hope Café: Miramichi's Best Charity

More than 235,000 people in Canada experience homelessness. To fix this, the volunteers at the Hope Café soup kitchen are doing their part to help our community by feeding people in need of a warm meal and helping others get through tough times of Covid. Also, they show how great Miramichi is at coming together as a community. Miramichi's soup kitchen is the

best local charity I know and here is why.

To start, I've seen firsthand how many people in Miramichi need a warm meal, and its more than you might think. Miramichi Hope Café serves free meals to the community every Friday from 12pm noon to 1pm year-round at the Saint Andrews Anglican Church Hall at 214 Pleasant Street in Newcastle. It all started when Rev. Richard Steeves and Deacon Rose Steeves opened Hope Café for the first time 12 years ago, four people came. Now, up to 70 people show up. The first meal ever served was a bowl of soup, currently they serve a full plate of food that comes with a bottle of water and dessert!

The teams at Hope Café must have been very nervous when COVID-19 hit New Brunswick in 2020. The Canadian food system has been stretched by the impacts of COVID-19. Consequently, Miramichi's soup kitchen changed the way they operated things by handing out packaged meals. Therefore, reducing the amount of contact they have with the

people receiving these meals. They have done a great job of doing their part to help flatten the curve!

The soup kitchen is run entirely by volunteers from churches across the Miramichi community. Along with some help from family members of the volunteers, like me! The food they use at Hope Café comes from donations from places like Walmart and

Carroll's Bakery. Another organization that donates funds is the Rotary Club of Chatham. As a result of these great acts of kindness, Hope Café is a perfect example of how the Miramichi community can come together!

In my opinion, Hope Café is Miramichi's best charity. They give people in need a warm meal, bring the community together and are helping people get through Covid. In the long run, Miramichi's soup kitchen will always be there for you if you need them.

Avery Fitzpatrick is the 16-year-old grand-daughter of Anne Hebert, Co-ordinator at the Hope Café. Anne organizes four teams of five volunteers who prepare and serve the meals each week. By 9am on Friday they are busy in the kitchen cooking the hot meals from scratch and getting them ready for take-out. Donations are always welcome, in the form of cash, food, or grocery store gift cards.





Miramichi Author Releases Book on his Hometown's History

Woodstock-born journalist and historian Nathan DeLong launched his first book in October with a virtual presentation on Facebook and YouTube.

DeLong began calling Miramichi home after moving to the city in 2018 to accept a job as a reporter and photographer at the Miramichi Leader following internships at the Telegraph-Journal in Saint John and his hometown publication, the Bugle-Observer.

Many locals would recognize DeLong as a byline in the Leader and as someone who covers city council and reports on the Miramichi Timberwolves and other initiatives and events in the region. He is also an active member of The Point Church.

DeLong's self-published book, Woodstock: New Brunswick's Oldest Town Through the Years, covers the history of the Woodstock area from the late-1600s to the present day. It highlights how the town came to be and got where it is today, starting with the Fort Meductic Indigenous village and leading up to the Wolastogivik (Maliseet) peoples' contact with Loyalist settlers following the United States Revolutionary War.

DeLong's book also touches on the

formation of Carleton County, the town's 1856 incorporation, and a few large fires that nearly halted the town's growth in its tracks, along with an 1847

riot between religious denominations, a railway hub, a park on an island, and a man who was hanged twice for murder in the early 1900s.

DeLong's interest in local history began in 2007 with a heritage fair project at school. His curiosity was influenced by anecdotes from his grandparents, relatives, and friends who shared their lived experiences from

days gone by, and these recollections inspired him to pursue a project on Woodstock.

DeLong, who became a published writer at age 14, began working on a book in 2016 while studying journalism at St. Thomas University in Fredericton. He was surprised by the lack of recent editions published on the town's heritage, although it has a rich history and prides itself on its status as New Brunswick's oldest incorporated town.

New Brunswick's Woodstock: Oldest Town Through the Years is topically organized around multiple themes and provides a chronological description of the town's early years, the post-war era, and the present day. It includes essays on both widely known and rarely discussed stories, while also incorporating vintage and recent photographs.

The 246-page, paperback book is available for purchase for \$30 on Amazon and at Mill Cove Coffee. An ebook is currently being developed, and distribution at other retailers is being arranged. Books can also be purchased contacting DeLong anathandelong@gmail.com.

Peanut Butter Grape Bites

"My students are at all different skill levels, and some come for the social aspect and "therapy" that painting provides, while others are serious about becoming artists," says Edie. She encourages her students to not copy her work,



but to learn the basic techniques and find their own style. "I teach them about using colour and contrast, how to create shadows and light, and give them the freedom to be creative with brushes or palette knives. Everyone puts their


own feelings into the painting, so they all come out different."

Edie describes her style as romantic realism, and she loves painting with lots of colour. She paints everything from memory, or her imagination, and she likes to put a little bit of mystery in a painting in the form of not showing something. "The hope of any artist is for their work to evoke emotions from people. I want them to feel something and to keep looking for what is, or maybe isn't there in a painting – to wonder what is behind the foggy mist, or where does that path lead."

Monthly oil painting classes are held at the United Church Centre in Newcastle (556 King George Hwy) from 1pm to 5pm. For \$65 you take home a completed 16 x 20

stretched canvas painting. All set-up, clean-up, and supplies are provided, along with refreshments at breaktime – coffee, tea and dessert.




Old-time Christmas Favourites

I love looking through cookbooks, especially the old ones. These recipes come from an old Purity Cook book that my mother and father gave to my grandmother as a Christmas present in 1946. It has been well-used over the years and I remember Gram and my mother making many of the recipes. The pages of the favourite ones are worn and stained with flour and love.

Below are a couple of our family favourites, often enjoyed at Christmas when dad would come from the store with a bag of dried raisins. They are presented here exactly as they are written in the book, and as you can see, they didn't give many directions back then. You either knew what to do, or you didnt. I've added a note at the end of each recipe.



Raisin Pie Filling

1 cup brown sugar
2 tbls purity flour
a few grains of salt
1 cup water
zest of 1 lemon
juice of 1 lemon
1 cup raisins (dark sultana)

Mix together sugar, flour and salt. Add water and lemon juice and mix well. Stir in lemon rind and raisins. Cook over hot water for 15 min. Cool and pour into a pastry shell. Cover with top crust. Bake at 350 for 45 minutes.

Note: Cook over hot water refers to using a double boiler. I used 1/8 tsp salt for "a few grains".



Egg Nogg

1 egg 2tsp sugar a few grains of salt 3/4 cup of milk flavouring

Beat egg. Add sugar and salt, milk and flavouring. Blend thoroughly and serve.

Note: This recipe is also delicious warmed in a pot over medium heat, stirring constantly, until hot, steamy and bubbles form around edges (not boiling). For the flavouring I suggest using in 1/4 tsp of vanilla extract, a sprinkle of cinnamon or nutmeg, and you could even top it with whipped cream. This recipe was actually in the section of the book called invalid recipes. And I do remember when I was younger if someone was sick, they were given egg nog to help bring them around.

Editors Note: According to the Egg Farmers of Ontario website (getcracking.ca) it is safe to consume raw eggs in Canada due to strict inspection protocols, and the chances of finding salmonella in store bought Canadian eggs is next to nothing. Use fresh, refridgerated, Grade A stamped eggs, well before the best before date.



Miramichi Cross Country Ski Club

The cat is out of the bag - Miramichi's best kept secret winter spot has become more well known! Perhaps it was the move to the new clubhouse right beside route 126 in the Nelson area of the city, but certainly the challenge of finding something to do during the COVID-19 restrictions was also a factor in having a full club parking lot on many weekends last season.

We hope that many of the people who visited the Miramichi Cross Country Ski Club (MCCSC) last year will return again. The club has been part of the Miramichi landscape for almost 50 years.

We maintain a variety of trails for three sports: **cross-country skiing (Nordic), biathlon and snowshoeing**. Our trails wind through a mixed woodland that surrounds Carding Mill Brook. Some of our ski trails are for the traditional classic technique, others are wider and allow for **both classic and skate skiing**. The shortest trail is just 0.3km, suitable for skiers as young as 3 years old. The longest trail is the 12 km classic Silver Trail. There is also 4 km of lighted trail which allows for evening skiing during our long winter nights.

We are fortunate to have **one of the few biathlon ranges in the province.** Biathlon is a popular sport in Europe which combines shooting at a target and skate skiing. You can imagine that it is difficult to shoot cleanly after a strenuous ski. If you see the red flag flying at the shooting range, then



it is in use. Anyone interested in biathlon can stop by to watch on Saturday mornings when the biathletes are in training at the range.

Snowshoeing has become increasingly popular at the club. The snowshoe trails are separate from the ski trails and are well protected from the wind. Six km of trails are in successive loops of 1 km so one can easily choose a distance to cover. Snowshoes are available for rent at the clubhouse

for adults and children.

Ski rentals are also available at the club for adults and children. The ski club offers **seasonal memberships** for those who anticipate using the trails often but also **daily trail passes** are also available.



You can choose to get a snowshoe only membership or a ski membership, which includes use of the snowshoe trails. Introductory adults ski lessons are offered early in the season.

Youth programs for learning to ski and for the biathlon club take place every year.

People Helping People... One Drive at a Time

Limited transportation is a hard reality for some individuals and families living in Northumberland County,

especially for those with a low income or living in a rural setting where taxi services or public transit do not operate.

The impacts of limited transportation are significant: increase risk of isolation, missed medical appointments; reduced community and workforce participation; and barriers to access basic needs such as food and medication. This in return affects the health and well-being of our community members.

Addressing Transportation Gaps


Transportation challenges are not a new problem, nor are

they unique to our region. In Charlotte County, the alternative transportation service called Dial-A-Ride has been operating since 2005 to help address transportation gaps. The program relies on volunteer drivers who provide an affordable door-to-door ride-home service. The volunteer-base model has since been adopted by different regions of the province.

In 2021, The Northumberland Community Inclusion Network (CIN), who identifies affordable and inclusive transportation as one of its priorities, initiated a dial-a-ride program for its serviced communities: Miramichi, Sunny Corner, Baie Ste Anne, Neguac, Rogersville, Blackville,

Renous- Quarryville and the surrounding areas.

Northumberland Community
Transportation was created to oversee the program, and a
Transportation Coordinator was hired to coordinate the services.



The Northumberland Volunteer Driver Program has been created to provide a reliable, safe, affordable, and inclusive transportation service for the residents of Northumberland.

Volunteers, who undergo a prior screening process, are

responsible for transporting clients from their home to their destination. Medical appointments are the priority bookings, followed by basic needs such as food provision, prescriptions, work, and education.

The service is available during hours of operation Monday to Friday and depending on volunteers' availabilities. Clients must reserve their rides in advance by phone. The program does not cover emergency travel requests.







The 'Heart and Soul' of our Operation


Volunteer drivers are the "heart and soul" of our operation. We recognize that without volunteers donating their time and usage of their personal vehicle, this essential service would not be possible. For this reason, we provide reimbursement for their mileage as well as cover other program registration fees that may occur, such as insurance premium difference and drivers' abstract expenses.

We also work around our volunteers' availabilities. We appreciate any personal time that they may provide; be it a few hours a week or a few hours a month. Most importantly, we prioritize the safety of our volunteers and clients. Consequently, COVID-19 public health guidelines are followed during the pandemic.



How I Became Addicted to Stained Glass (part 1) By Paulette Arsenault

In this issue of the Giv'er, I wish to share with you my addiction to the wonderful world of stained glass. My journey started more than 45 years ago when I left Miramichi to find my way in the world. At 17, I didn't know what I wanted in life or how to achieve it. My journey took some unexpected twists and turns, and ended full circle back in Miramichi.

I started my journey in Campbellton where I became a registered nursing assistant (RNA). After working in hospitals in both New Brunswick and Ontario, I joined my brother Daniel, in Montreal and returned to school. Big cities offer big opportunities and I embarked in a social work career after completing a Bachelors and Masters in Social Work at McGill University. All of this while working evenings and nights as an RNA. I had a wonderful 30-year career at the Montreal Association for the Blind where I retired at 60.

My husband and I bought a house in Miramichi in 2012 with a plan to return back home in 2017. We both fell in love with the beauty of the region. I could not see myself sitting around doing nothing after an exciting career and lifestyle in Montreal, so I prepared for retirement by taking lessons in guitar, Tai Chi, yoga and stained glass.

Throughout my career I was never very artistically oriented but started slowly developing an affinity to stained glass. I now understand that all good artists require a good technique, same with stained glass. To work with stained glass, you need a small space with a workbench and some tools, the most expensive being the grinder. I work in my basement in winter and the garage in the summer.

The stained glass process:

First, I find a design on the internet. Second, I decide on the size of the finished piece, add a colour code and print the design on my laser printer using available free software. This Hummingbird (see photo), found on the internet was modified by adding the corner diamond shaped glass and surrounding solid glass colour. Third, using the paper print-out, I place a cut out or piece of paper on the glass and draw an outline with a permanent marker. I then cut the outline with a special glass cutter. Fourth, I use a special grinder with a diamond dust head to shape the piece of glass to the desired and precise contour. Fifth, once all the pieces are cut and shaped (like a puzzle), I clean the glass, apply copper foil and solder the pieces together,

on both sides, with a soldering iron. **Sixth**, I wash the piece, apply a patina or special finish to the solder and wax it with a liquid wax. **Seventh**, I hang the finished piece in a window and enjoy the colours in all their glory.

During the pandemic I went through a butterfly phase that morphed into an archway in my living room. The Maritime scene below was designed to be hung on a wall, hence the use of opaque glass.

Don't Take Anything Personally


Nothing others do is because of you. What others say and do is a projection of their own reality. When you are immune to the opinions and actions of others you won't be the victim of needless suffering.



Enviroporta: Radon Fighters

November is **National Radon Awareness month**, and Enviroporta is encouraging you to test indoor air for radon.

With free training available to medical doctors by Health Canada, free resources such as the 100 Radon Test Kits Challenge available to science teachers and community leaders, radon awareness is making its way into households, towards a safer indoor air to breathe. The fall/winter heating season is the best time to test indoor radon levels.

Radon Mitigation Saves Lives.

Water from a roof leak is undesirable and so is radon seeping indoors from the ground upward. Radon mitigation consists of reducing radon gas concentrations in the air we breathe at homes or at work. Each of our radon mitigation systems is customized for your needs. As an added benefit, a lot of moisture is routed out while evicting radon and many clients have discarded their dehumidifiers. We have noticed that radon testing is often only done at the request of a buyer when someone is selling their home. They realize that their family have spent years exposed to radon and they then have to pay for the radon mitigation as per Canadian CARST protocol, as a buyer expects a home to be safe.


The guideline is 200 Bq/m3.

For homes between 200 Bq/m3 and 600 Bq/m3, Health Canada recommends radon mitigation within two years and within one year for levels over 600 Bq/m3. More than 30% of Canadian houses presenting more that 900 Bq/m3 in the above-mentioned Cross Canada Radon Survey were in NB, but only 6% of the homes surveyed were in New Brunswick!






