







Miramichi Folksong Festival Changing Guard on a High Note

Being involved with the Miramichi Folksong Festival is old hat for Melanie Ross Breen.

The renowned Miramichi musician and educator first performed at the annual festival around 1980, when she was 10.

Now, more than four decades later, she's taking over as the festival's volunteer director after award-winning singer Susan Butler's 39 years at the helm.

"I really love this festival," said Ross Breen, who lives in Nova Scotia. "I feel very honoured and humbled to take this on."

Ross Breen became interested in the festival after singing in her church choir and learning her first song, a 25-verse tune about the Great Miramichi Fire of 1825. She later took lessons over the phone from Miramichi-area folksinger Marie Hare and recorded Hare's music onto cassette tapes to rehearse.

Ross Breen currently serves as vice-principal of the Halifax Regional Centre for Education. She studied music at Mount Allison University in Sackville and has performed around the world, often introducing Miramichi folksongs to international audiences.

Ross Breen has played alongside Butler's children and other musicians. For at least two decades, she has emceed portions of the folksong festival. She said Butler has long been grooming her to lead the festival, but only asked her in

"I have a lot of respect for [festival founder] Louise Manny, [past director] Maisy Mitchell, and Susan, who were strong women and have

carried this on," she said.

Blending the past, present, and future The festival is entering its 65th year and is set for Aug. 4 to 7. Ross Breen said she plans to switch it from a week-long event to a weekend format, and opening-night acts will include tunes from previous fan favourites.

A pub night will also be added in 2022, Ross Breen said, and family activities will coincide with

the kids' show. A noon luncheon will take place Aug. 5, and the festival will return to its roots at the

Beaverbrook Kin Centre.

"It's about honouring the past while also acknowledging the present," said Ross Breen. "We need to celebrate what we have on the Miramichi because it's valuable.

"I hope to carry on Louise Manny's legacy of hosting a festival for and about Miramichiers, with lots of Miramichi content."

Butler, who turns 76 in October, said her time as director was "an education in itself," but she's eager to move into an advisory role and see Ross Breen put her stamp on the festival. She said Ross Breen headed up the 2020 virtual festival – held due to the pandemic – that allowed the event to maintain its status as Canada's longest-running folk festival.

"There comes a time when change is needed," said Butler. "Having Melanie take over is a huge relief. You can't just nab anyone and ask them to take on this festival without them knowing the background or what's involved."

Beaubears Shipbuilding Archaeologist Tour

Only offered two days this summer July 23 and August 20 at 1 pm, by reservation only. \$20 per person.

By 1870, all shipbuilding had ceased on Beaubears Island. The island began a very slow process of being reclaimed by nature, erasing the evidence of human activity. An archeological report was conducted on the Island in 1977. Even then, what was still visible was fading into the everincreasing forest.

Today, there are some traces of what was happening back in those days of wooden sailing ships but they too will slowly recede into the shadows of the trees and eventually be lost. A tour will be conducted for those who wish to see what still remains and what is overlooked when visitors don't know what to look for. It will be a gentle walk into the past, from the east end of the island to the west end shipbuilding sites. Put on your walking boots and come for the journey through time.





Miramichi Ground Search And Rescue How A Search Starts

In this issue of *Giv'er* magazine, I wish to describe the process of an actual search and rescue operation, how it is activated and how it can save lives:

"Philippe it's the police on the phone".

That was my greeting to Philippe, coming back from a wood carving class at the Sawdustmakers on a Thursday afternoon at 2:55 pm. It was a police officer from the MPD, the acting incident commander requesting the help of the Miramichi Ground Search and Rescue (MGSAR) in finding an elderly person suffering from Alzheimer's that was last seen at 10:30 am outside the old Seamen's Hospital. I forwarded the call to the president and search manager of the organization who quickly sent phone, text, and email messages to all MGSAR members thru SarQ, our activation protocol system. By 3:10 pm the search was officially activated.

From this point on, all the member training kicks in, and an orchestrated ballet of actions and events take place simultaneously. I arrive at the base at 3:15 pm where all our equipment is kept. The first step is composing the command structure according to the available members answering the call to action: search manager (in charge of the search), planning, operations, and logistics chiefs, who will be responsible for their part of the search operation.

The two operational trailers that we bring to the hospital, the command post (CP) and the logistics trailer, are loaded with the required search equipment and members support equipment (food, beverage, protective gear, first aid, etc.). A small tactical strike unit called a hasty team is dispatched at 3:35 pm to the search area, with maps, compass, GPS, and the person's description, scouting roads and trails that are the most accessible to the

lost person.

Once the gear is prepped and ready, the rest of the members are sent to a defined place called the IPP (the initial planning point of the search) where the CP and logistics trailers are installed at 4:15 pm. The IPP is where everything starts, and time is of the essence. There is only

five hours of daylight left, the weather forecast calls for below 0°C during the night, and our lost person wears only a shirt.

While the two hasty teams of four members each, are out, the rest of the MGSAR volunteers organize the command post and the planners start organizing team tasks for groups of five to seven searchers. The planning is done with regards to the lost person's physical and





psychological profile called lost person behavior (LPB) and the terrain features such as dense forest, bogs, farmland, etc. The hasty teams return to the CP with their observations on land conditions that are incorporated into the next assigned tasks. Three teams called Alpha, Bravo and Charlie are dispatched to specific zones with specific search patterns.


Once the teams complete their task, their GPS tracks are inputted in our mapping software called SARX which visually shows the planner what areas have been searched and helps prepare the next tasks. All this while the teams



are in constant radio communication with the CP with punctual updates on clues of all kinds. This went on until we received a "Sierra Lima" (subject located) radio dispatch at 8:00 pm. Our lost person was well but suffering from hypothermia, two kilometres from the hospital. A great ending to this search,

but not all searches have good endings.

Memories of Harkins Reunion 2022

I watched Harkins High School come down; Saw the bricks and heavy girders Come crashing to the ground. And though it did cause me some pain, The memories of Harkins still remain. John Harkins left a trust fund to erect the original Harkins School, built of wood in 1867, burned to the ground in 1893, replaced by a stone structure in 1894, extended to its present appearance in 1909, and known as Harkins Academy.

John Harkins died in 1847 and would not see the school built to service all children of the parish, regardless of financial situation or faith. Nor did Harkins see the construction of Harkins Academy High School in 1924, its extension in 1955 or the building, right next to it, of Harkins Academy Junior High School, completed in 1960. It was just as well. Fifty-eight years later, all three came tumbling down.

Prior to that in 2017, the Graduation Class of 1967, held a 50-year Reunion get-together. The former graduates were able to tour their Alma Mater just one last time.



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Equine Massage Therapy

Yes, horses get massages too! Equine Massage Therapy is the manipulation of soft tissues (muscles, tendons, ligaments, fascia) on the horse's body to help remove restrictions, tension, and discomfort. Very similar to a human massage, it can be general, for overall relaxation, or focused on specific areas that are sore or tense.

An appointment typically begins with an assessment of the horse's whole body to identify areas of tension and discomfort. Horses don't speak with words, but they do communicate a lot with their body language, so the assessment helps identify areas that should be focused on during the massage. The massage involves different manipulations on the horse's body with varying levels of pressure. The total duration depends on the horse and the situation, but on average it is around 1 hr to 1.5 hrs.

The massage takes place wherever the horse is most comfortable: it can be in a stall, the aisle, the ring, an outdoor shelter or even in the middle of the field. If the footing is flat and dry, and the environment is fairly calm, the massage can take place anywhere. Horses usually stand during the massage and are attuned to it. They sometimes doze off, and they might even lie down, but horses can sleep standing so they typically stay in the upright position.

There are different situations when a massage could be beneficial. There might be a specific concern: the horse doesn't move as usual or has a lameness, is showing a behaviour change (for example, the horse is grumpy for no obvious reason), or is sore when being brushed or saddled. A horse owner might incorporate massage therapy on a routine basis for preventative care (for example, regular visits during the show season for competing horses, which helps prevent


injuries, release body tensions and improves muscle performance), or seasonal visits for older horses or arthritic horses to help manage their pain. And some horse owners

simply book an appointment occasionally, just to give their horse a little make-you-feel-good gift.

Equine massage therapy has many health benefits, including tension relief, improved circulation and mobility, and overall wellbeing. It is a complementary and preventative therapy; it is not a replacement for a veterinarian's advice. 


