

Reviving a Comedy Gem: *Mullin's Boom* Takes the Stage with Character Matters Miramichi




"Mullin's Boom," a folksong first performed in 1823 by the inmates of the Newcastle jail, and thought to be so politically subversive that it was banned by law not long afterwards, will be brought to life again, for its bicentennial year, by a new performing troupe, **Character Matters Miramichi.** Performances are scheduled at Folklore Park in Renous, the weekend of **April 29**; at the Woodmen's Museum in Boiestown, **May 6**; and in Miramichi, **May 12-13**.

The song itself detailed an altercation between local lumbermen, and a group of loggers from Maine, along the Southwest Miramichi, sometimes referred to as the "Battle of Musha-Whack." The local workers accused their American counterparts of intruding and cutting on their territory. As might be expected then, the script takes a humorous tone, as a set of locals – Frank Gleason, John Burroughs, and Michael Darby – **escape the Newcastle jail on Halloween Night and flee to the Southwest**, where they find work with the logging crews of Robert Doak. Trying to earn their way with saw and axe, little do they realize that the industrious Thomas Boies



has sent Ron Alden, Jerry Garfield and Teddy Gordon, recently arrived from Maine, to cut for him on the very same ground. Confusion and excitement abound, as these two bands of woodsmen face off in a bout that was best captured in verse.

The play is the first feature from Character Matters Miramichi, a local heritage theatre business founded by **Thomas Daley and Shawn McCarthy**. Thomas



studied Acting at Vancouver Film School and has worked to combine entertainment, tourism and heritage to create enriching experiences in both Vancouver and in Miramichi. He currently lives in Semiwagan Ridge with his wife Klara. For his part, Shawn is a Western University doctoral graduate in history, perhaps best known for his time at the Boishébert and Beaubears Island Shipbuilding National Historic Sites of Canada, where he specialized in experiential heritage offerings, utilizing on-site, character-based, re-enactment.

The two are long-time friends, and have worked together on a number of projects, including the revival of the **Dare the Dark: Headless Nun Experience**, scheduled to return in July 2023, under the Character Matters Miramichi banner.

Spring thaw

Due to the extreme mild temperature this winter, there is concern for the upcoming spring thaw. Homeowners should prepare early and monitor when there is an announcement for large rain events or very mild temperatures. Helpful hints to prevent flooding:

- ice or snow build up around and next to the foundation.
- locate and clear the outlet of your foundation drain.
- monitor ditches for excess build-up of water or ice.
- check you sump pump ensure it is working.
- ensure your down spouts are clear and directed away from the foundation.
- if there is storm catch basin located next to your property ensure it accessible.

Spring Leaf pickup

The City of Miramichi wishes to advise City residents that FERO will be picking up leaves separate from regular household garbage for two Saturdays, May 6th and May 27th. All leaves should be at curbside no later than 7 a.m. Please note: It is recommended that leaves be in biodegradable bags.

Water main flushing

The City of Miramichi annual watermain flushing program is scheduled for June 1 to August 15. Please monitor the City website, radio and newspaper, and social media for the exact flushing dates in your area.

During scheduled flushing dates in your area, please be aware and try not to wash clothing or have excess usage of water between 7 a.m. and 7 p.m. Once flushing is completed, run your bathtub for 5 to 8 minutes as this will clear the service line to your home.

A Passion for Learning: The Creative Journey of Gerard Godin By Stacy Underhill

Gerard Godin has dreamed of being an artist ever since he was a five-year-old boy living in Miramichi.

It was during the summer of 1962 when his mother's closest friend presented him with a paint-by-number set that Gerard's passion for art was ignited. His lifelong pursuit of art and learning began that day, and he recalls some of the earlier art mentors he had growing up. "Pauline Losier, mom's friend, took care of old Jimmy Dunn who lived in the big, old house overlooking Ritchie Wharf. I got to visit him, and he was one of the first people to encourage me and to recognize my talent. Later, I studied with a Quebec artist who lived in the Miramichi Valley High School." says Godin.

Gerard was raised around talented influences; his mother sang in the Miramichi Folksong Festival in English and in French, and made crafts, sewed, and baked wonderful pastries. His godparents, the late Maisy Mitchell and Vince Mitchell were important figures in his life. "They opened my mind to a world of possibilities," Gerard says.

After living in Toronto for 32 years, Gerard Godin now has a home and studio, Studio 12, in Douglastown. "I grew up here and it feels good to be home and reconnect with family, friends and the province," Gerard says.


After seeing photos of Gerard's paintings and sculptures, I had the opportunity to ask him a few questions about his inspirations and journey as an artist.

What styles or mediums do you work in?

"I like to experiment and really learn and play with styles and mediums. Over the last 50 years, I started with crayons, water colour, oils, and then acrylics. In 2000 in Toronto, I got the rare opportunity, to join the Al Green Sculpture Studio & School, where I greatly expanded my use of mediums. I

created sculptures in plaster, bronze, resins, wood, and many other materials. I even got to work in jewellery design, creating works in precious metals and stones. I consider myself a better sculpture than painter. Practicing my craft is the best training. I'm always learning, and I hope I always can."

What inspires you as an artist?

"I get inspiration from everywhere: living and having adventures, my friends, nature, especially the flowers, water, and sky. I enjoy interacting with other artists to see what they are doing and to learn and be inspired by them. And of course, the wonderful artists who came before me. I love the

Italian and Dutch masters, and the great Canadians, such as the Group of Seven and Emily Carr. In fact, I've been so fortunate to work with many great women artists, like Maryon Kantaroff who was my mentor for 20 years."

What is the best advice you've been given with respect to your art?

"The best advice I got was from Sorel Etrog, who was a wonderful Canadian artist. He said, 'To be an artist, you must work at your craft everyday, and you should complete a finished piece every week.' I try, but I have to say, it's easier said than done."

What advice do you have for emerging artists feeling hesitant to display their art?

"Get out there and show your work. I too get affected by criticism and societal expectations, but you must push through it and believe in yourself. My art, and creating it, brings me joy and has helped me through many hard times. It's been part of me and my life for so long that I don't know what else I'd do with my time."

Describe your process of creating a piece, from inspiration to finish.

"My process is ever-changing.

Sometimes I see a beautiful ocean view with a dramatic sky and deep blue water, and I sketch it quickly and then paint it. Other times, I take a more academic approach and the work may take a long time. I leave it, sometimes for years, and then come back to it. There is no rule that I can see. I take it day by day, work by work."


Gerard has exhibited his work at many galleries and shows in Toronto, such as the Sculptors Society of Canada. He also created all the sculptures for Metropia, the 90-episode TV soap opera in 2004-06. He is excited to now be part of the arts community in Miramichi. Last year he participated in Artists on the Island at Beaubears Island and in March of this year he had an exhibit at ARTcadienne Gallery at Carrefour Beausoleil.

A Symphony of Color: Exploring the World of Warblers By Mathieu Carroll

At a quick glance, we could think this article is about a tropical vacation; a far away land filled with colourful birds. In fact, all these birds were photographed right here in Miramichi. Don't believe me? They belong to a group called warblers.

The **Wood Warblers** (F: Parulidae) **of North America** are some of the most colourful birds in the entire northern hemisphere. In *Field Guide to the Birds* (1934), famed American naturalist Roger Tory Peterson describes them as the *sprightly "butterflies" of the bird world*. Fitting, because their beauty is matched only by their diversity.

There are many kinds of warblers. Twenty-three species spend their summer here in New Brunswick while another 14 others pass through on occasion. **Warblers make up roughly half of all birds in our forest.** Yes! Often, our idea of songbirds comes from seed feeders while most species actually only eat insects. They spend their time in trees and bushes out of sight and largely out of mind.


Warblers are also **champion migrators**. Lack of insects and cold weather force them to fly south in the fall. The following spring, they race back in waves; warm weather marks the return of insects and the breeding season. The spring migration rush is also an exciting time for birdwatchers. The bulk of the migrating birds pass through before tree leaves have a chance to open. The bare trees provide an opportunity for us to see these otherwise elusive birds. There are only a couple of weeks of viewing before foliage reclaims the branches.

Nature Miramichi invites the public to join the **Warbler Walks** held in May. These guided bird walks at French Fort Cove take advantage of the viewing window and are a great way for new birdwatchers to see and identify songbirds.

Local Skateboarders Featured in TV Series, Skate le Monde. By Vanessa Hebert, Bartibog

Did you know the Miramichi region was featured in an international TV show about skateboarding? The series is called Skate le Monde (Skate the World) and is broadcast on TV5 Canada and TV5 Monde.

The host, Mathieu Cyr, travels the world to skate in beautiful cities with interesting skateboarders with diverse stories. Even if you are not a skateboarding fan, the scenes are worth watching. During the two seasons, they traveled to at least 22 countries. We learn how Cuban skateboarders managed to skate when their authorities thought it was a rebellious activity. In England, we learn that skateboarding is considered a serious sport and a social and economic resource.

The principal skater interviewed in the Miramichi region was Maurice Savoie from Neguac. Maurice, age 31, finished high school at C.S.C. La Fontaine in from Burnt Church and Sunny Corner. Neguac and went on to study mechanics.

He now owns a garage in New Jersey, ten minutes before Neguac, which is also where he practices his tricks and creates skateboarding rails, ramps, and other equipment.

Maurice Savoie skated in the USA in the most iconic pro world event, the Tampa Pro in Florida. During this event, he skated on national live TV with the famous pro skater Evan Smith. Maurice also represented the sneaker brand Globe.

The series visits **Burnt Church**, Esgenoôpetitj First Nation, where Maurice skated a lot when he was younger and we meet Maurice's skateboard friends such as Frank Johnson.

In the video, we see where they skate in Burnt Church, on a cement slab in a sunny spot close to the water, with a view of the fishing boats. Many of the ramps and rails come

from Maurice's garage. Unfortunately, the space will soon be used for something else. Maurice and his friends are working on building a skate park beside the Petro-Canada in Burnt Church on Route 11, with fundraising and a lot of work. They plan to name the future park after their skateboard friend who passed away in 2019, Tyrelle Augustine.

The episode also features Sunny Corner and a particular barn named "The Shred Shed," where Billy Hubbard and his grandfather built a mini halfpipe and space to play music. Maurice and some skaters from all over New Brunswick enjoyed it. Jesse Spencer, a skateboarder from Ontario who moved to the Maritimes, also visited the Shred Shed from time to time. Even though it's a private skate barn, people can contact Billy on Instagram to be invited.

In the episode, the **Cabot Trail** in Nova Scotia is also featured, where a Vancouver family decided to move and turn a church into a tourist hostel and skateboard longboard museum. Longboard skaters are the ones who roll down big, paved mountains at extreme speeds on a skateboard. The cameras capture them rolling down the majestic hills of the Cabot Trail.

Skateboarding enthusiasts and Miramichi locals alike will enjoy seeing familiar places featured in this international TV series, showcasing not only the beauty of the region but also the talent of local skateboarders. 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Fifty Years of Playing their Cards Right: Newcastle Duplicate Bridge Club By Graham Wade

The Newcastle Duplicate Bridge Club (NDBC) was formed **nearly fifty years ago** with the assistance of directors and players from CFB Chatham and St. Margarets. Over the years the club has continued to provide entertainment to many resident players and visitors alike. Duplicate bridge clubs are found in every country of the world and an avid player will be certain to find a club where ever he or she might be travelling.

Duplicate bridge is a variation of contract bridge where the same set of

bridge deals (i.e., the distribution of the 52 cards among the four hands) are played by different competitors, and scoring is based on relative performance. In this way, every hand, whether strong or weak, is played in competition with others playing identical cards, and the element of skill is heightened while that of chance is reduced. This stands in contrast to bridge played without duplication, where each hand is freshly dealt and where scores may be more affected by chance in the short run.

Four-way card holders known as bridge boards are used to enable each player's hand to be preserved from table to table, and final scores are calculated by comparing each pair's result with others who played the same hand.

In duplicate bridge, players normally play all the hands with the same partner and compete either as a partnership (in a 'Pairs tournament') or on a team with one or more other partnerships ('Teams tournament' -



players are usually allowed to change partner within their team at any point if they wish).

Individual tournaments also exist, in which players change partnerships regularly during the tournament and are ranked on their personal performance.

Points are awarded at the club, unit, zone, and national levels. The points are designated colours depending on which level they were won: black, red, or gold. When you hear of someone becoming a Life Master it means he/she has

accumulated 300 black, 25 red, and 25 gold points. It might take a lifetime to achieve and it might be never, but the lure to compete is compelling.

The NDBC is part of the Canadian Bridge Federation, Zone 1, which in turn is part of the worldwide organization, The American Contract Bridge League, headquartered in Mississippi, USA. The ACBL is the governing body for all bridge clubs in North America and Bermuda.

The NDBC has three **regular sanctioned games** at the Nelson Ski Club on Monday afternoon at 12:30 pm, Wednesday evening at 6:30 pm and Thursday afternoon at 12:30 pm.

Lessons for beginners are being currently held on Sunday afternoon, also at the Ski Club facilities.

Final Book of the *Miramichi Lads & Ladies* Series Book Launch April 15 By Johannes Bosma

In 2017, I began a project to honour Miramichi veterans who were ultimately responsible for the liberation of the German occupied nations of Europe, in particular Holland - the land of my birth. That project resulted in Book One of Miramichi Lads & Ladies: We Will Remember Them in 2020 which led to *Book Two* in 2021 and now this year to Book Three. In this final book of the series, I decided to feature only those from the Miramichi and surrounding areas, with a few exceptions.

There are fifteen veterans from **Chatham**, including Bud McKenzie and Joe Hawkes (WWI) and Len Robertson and Fred Whitty (WWII). Ten biographies are about **Newcastle** veterans like Herb Belyea (WWI) and from WWII, Robert Chambers, Fay Kitchen, Stafford MacCullum, and Bill Casey, who was probably the first Miramichier to land in Normandy on D-Day.

From the **Black River / Bay du Vin** area are stories about six veterans including WWI veteran, Donald Ernest Watling, decorated with the Military Medal for Bravery in the Field. Others from this area who fought in WWII include James Auston Fraser and Alfred MacDonald. From **Loggieville**, are J.W. Stymiest and Donald Ernest Watling's

son, World War II veteran Ernie Watling who would be awarded the same medal of bravery as his father.

Ten veterans are featured from the Nelson / Chelmsford / Gray Rapids/ Barnaby and Blackville area including WWII veterans Thomas Carrigan, Warren Casey, Edward Brennan, Hod Curtis, Raymond Duffy, Malcolm Manderville and nurse, Florence MacLean. From **Rogersville** are the stories about Wilfred Joseph Hachez and David Robichaud.

In addition, the biographies of three veterans, namely Ernie Anderson (Burnt Church), Halliday MacKnight (New Jersey), and Ernest Taylor (Brantville) are featured.

In total, over 70 brave lads and one lady have their stories told along with additional features such as "Canadian Women at War," "The Loss and Return of the North Shore Name," "Living in Holland During the German Occupation in WWII," "The D-Day Plus One Jeep," and an essay by Aurora Sutton, who as a high school student has done extensive work on the Holocaust and will graduate from James M. Hill High School in June of this year.

After reading *Book Three*, historian Bruce Morton, author of *One Hundred Years: A Brief History of the North Shore* *(NB) Regiment*, wrote: "Johannes Bosma has done an excellent job assembling a collection of biographies and stories of the Miramichi men and women who served Canada during WW1 and WW2.

"Part of John's expression of gratitude are his three volumes of *Miramichi Lads and Ladies*. In *Book Three* he again provides us with real-life stories of those who gave up their youth, and many their lives, for the freedom and democracy that we have today. These are great stories."

Morton has also sent over 150 biographies of Canadian veterans, buried in Holland, to the Faces To Graves Committee. This Dutch volunteer group has provided photos and biographies of Canadian men who liberated Dutch families in 1944 and 1945. Many of those brave soldiers from the Miramichi are found in *Book Three*.

A launch of *Miramichi Lads & Ladies: We Will Remember Them! Book Three* will be held at Mill Cove Coffee shop in Newcastle from 10am-12pm on **April 15**, and at Creative Grounds in Chatham from 2-4pm. Copies of Book One and Two will also be available at the Mill Cove shop. The price of all the books is \$20 each. All profits from *Book Three* will go toward a student scholarship.

Greg Morris: A True Ironman

I am currently gathering stories for a book on some notable Miramichiers and was guite surprised not to find one on Greg Morris. I have always admired Greg for his contributions to Miramichi sports and education. his approachability, and his humbleness. Researching the four Hall and Wall of Fames Greg is inducted into, I put together the following story.

Greg Morris Chatham, of Miramichi NB, was an outstanding baseball and hockey player in his youth but recognized especially for a legendary coaching career in baseball A champion on and off the field, Greg and hockey with Tommies' High School teams and the Chatham Sr. Ironmen.

Morris has been inducted into four Hall and Wall of Fames.

four seasons on the ice, Greg accumulated 25 goals and 41 assists in 40 regular season games. In his senior year, he finished eighth in league scoring averaging just over two points per game.

On the field, Greg was the Tommies quarterback. In 1962-63, he led the team to a near-perfect regular season, losing in the final to the Saint John Wanderers. Greg was recognized for his achievements athletic as the university's Athlete of the Year in 1963. Two years later, Greg formed the high school hockey "Tommies" in Chatham, who he coached to 10 Provincial AAA titles. He's also had a storied coaching

career in baseball and has won numerous New Brunswick, Atlantic, and Canadian titles.

Greg was a member of the Tommies varsity football and hockey teams at St. Thomas University (STU). In

In 1988 Morris coached his Chatham midget



baseball team to a Silver Medal and in 1990 led his midget team to its first-ever Canadian Championship. New Brunswick sports fans cheered, just as they had done so often for this master-coach and his charges. Over a period of 31 years, he coached his hockey and baseball teams to more than 50 championships, ranging all the way from mosquito to senior and from provincial to international.

Like his STU coach, Vance Toner, Greg Morris instilled in literally hundreds of young athletes an appropriate mix of self-discipline and determination - traits that were the hallmark of his own playing years. Here is a coach who accepted challenges as they came and then, in record numbers, enjoyed the exhilaration of the well-earned victories that resulted. He lives

and coaches by the credo that ". . . if better is possible, then good is not enough."

Greg Morris began coaching baseball in 1961 and hockey in 1967. In addition, he coached the Chatham Senior Ironmen to seven provincial and four Maritime baseball championships. He also guided the Ironmen to Canadian senior title in 1995, one silver medal (1976) and three bronze medals (1975, 1979, and 1982) and was the General Manager of the Ironmen senior title in 2019 at Canadian National Championships.


Greg was named to the coaching staff of the Canadian National team for the 1978 World Baseball Championships, was head coach of the 1993 Canada Games baseball team and was inducted into the **Miramichi Wall of Fame** in 1990, and enrolled into the **New Brunswick Sports Hall of Fame**, June 1, 1991. He was later inducted into **NB Baseball Hall of Fame**

1996 and the **St. Thomas University Wall of Fame** in 2017.

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


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
