

All That Remains: W.S. Loggie (Part One)

This is the third in a three-part series titled "All that Remains," documenting three Miramichi entrepreneurs who lived in the period from 1837-1944. These entrepreneurs are: Jabez Bunting Snowball (1837-1904), David Ernest Hutchison (1847-1918) and William Stewart Loggie (1850-1944). These men changed the life Miramichi with their entrepreneurial spirit, political activism, and philanthropy. All three also displayed visionary qualities, looking ever towards the future, and imagining newer and outside world. This series explores what each man's legacy was; all that

remains to remind us of their lives and their times. The final piece, W.S. Loggie, encapsulates the life of the man who straddled both the 19th and 20th centuries and whose accomplishments laid the foundation for significant advances for his community.

William Stewart (W.S.) Loggie (1850-1944)

The Loggie family in Miramichi descends from the original couple, Robert and Margery (Hay) Logie who emigrated in 1779, from the Spey Valley in Scotland to Black Brook, Miramichi where they settled on 160 acres obtained from the Crown. In Scotland, Robert Logie had been involved with the salmon fishing industry, and it is documented in "With Axe and Bible" (Campey) that he was brought to Miramichi, along with other immigrants, by William Davidson, who wanted to increase the salmon fishery here. The Logie family (now commonly spelled "Loggie") increased, generation by generation, some settling in the Black Brook/Napan area, and others moving across the river to the Burnt Church area.

William Stewart (W.S) Loggie was born in 1850 in Burnt Church, the son of George and Ann (Morrison) Loggie and the great-grandson of the original settler, Robert. William's childhood was spent at Burnt Church

where his father was an original partner in the firm of Loggie and Anderson. George Loggie moved the business to Ferry Road, and died unexpectedly on April 16, 1869, at the age of 48, when a ferry sank while crossing the Miramichi River to Chatham. His son, William Stewart, left school at age 14 and was working in Chatham at the dry goods store of MacDougall and Snowball when opportunity knocked, J.B. Snowball (the first entrepreneur in this series) was looking to expand into sawmills, milling and shipping and he business of your own" to which W.S. replied, "That's just what I'm

going to do!"

At age 23, he set up a general store in what was called the "Commercial Building" on Water Street. In 1894, the firm was incorporated. Members of the corporation were: W.S. Loggie, Francis E. Winslow, Warren C. Winslow, Elspeth Loggie, George M.B. Loggie and J. K. Loggie. W.S. also acquired a tin shop and three brickyards. The company was called W.S. Loggie, Co. Ltd. In addition to dry goods and groceries, hardware, boots and shoes, furniture, ladies' and children's wear, automobile sales and service departments were added over the years.

The business also expanded into ownership of warehouse space at Ritchie Wharf and the storage there of fishing nets and equipment. Once this endeavour was established and incorporated, Loggie decided to go into the fish business. He bought fish directly from fishermen, and set up packing, canning and exporting fish, especially salmon and lobster.

The earliest branch of this work was established at Logiecroft in Kouchibouguac where a small store was set up to sell gear and supplies to local fishermen, as well as a large storage facility, an icehouse, a fleet of lobster boats, a cannery and a refrigeration unit. Salmon was an early venture here, which soon added mackerel, clams, crab, cod, shad, and shad roe to the roster of fishery products that were canned or frozen and readied for export to Canadian and American markets.

This business soon added the packing and exporting of blueberries

to its portfolio. As early as 1883, Loggie was processing and freezing blueberries for these large markets too. Loggie got involved with shipping his exports using his own schooners, which in turn led him to oversee the manufacture of lumber and to his ownership of several mills located in Miramichi and on the Acadian Peninsula.

At the apex of his business ventures, there were 12 canneries in operation in Northumberland, Gloucester, and Kent counties and 3 dozen smaller seasonal operations in New Brunswick, PEI and Quebec. By 1915 there were 36 vessels on the water belonging to W.S. Loggie. Branches of the original Loggie Store at Miramichi existed at many other locations on the North Shore. At the height of the Loggie Enterprise, products were being transported by rail and ship to markets in Europe, the USA, Argentina, and the West Indies. The fish and blueberry season was short, so many of these operations were opened and closed according to season, but the heart of the business was the main store in Chatham and its branches all around the North Shore.

By 1937, the Loggie Company was doing about one million dollars (\$20 million in today's dollars) worth of business a year. For many years, W.S. Loggie was the

largest exporter of lobster to France. Although the branch and factory managers had some control over their own operations, reports were compiled on a daily and weekly basis and submitted to the General Manager of the company at Chatham.

There were up to 800 employees on his payroll in the first decades of the 20th century. Many people living in Miramichi remember either working for Loggie or had someone in their family who did.

In Part Two of W.S. Loggie, in the next issue of Giv'er, we'll explore further this man's political involvements, his family life, and the end of his business empire. We'll also look at "What Remains" in Miramichi to remind us of this once-famous family and the entrepreneurial dynamo at its head.



Northumberland County Winter Bird List for 2023-2024

Since the late fall of 2011, Dave McLeod of Nature Miramichi has collated a list of birds sighted in Northumberland County from Dec. 1 until the end of February each winter. With the collaboration of many observers over the years, mostly in the east of the county, 124 bird species have been recorded. The list usually includes between 75 and 80 species.

The birds on the list fall into one of four categories:

- 1) Year-round residents
- 2) Late departing (and early returning) migrating summer breeding species,
- 3) Winter visiting species from further north and
- 4) Vagrant (or extended range) species.

The purpose of recording the presence of birds through the winter provides an months interesting database. Studying trends over the years can help identify changes in bird populations and give insight into the effects of global warming. It also is a means of sharing information about rare species that show up from time to time. It helps in the understanding of the

biodiversity in our Northumberland County and the realization that winter is not such a quiet time for wildlife.

People who maintain bird feeders through the winter have the best opportunity for interesting sightings. But also, those who are out and about in the countryside may also see some of the variety of winter birds that do not visit feeders.

Some of the less common but expected bird

species that might visit feeders any time during the winter include Northern Cardinals, Evening Grosbeaks and White-breasted Nuthatches. Rare Red-bellied Woodpeckers and a Carolina Wren at the limit of their normal range, have spent time at our feeders in the winter, in the past. Some birds that normally migrate south for the winter may hang about if they are confident about a secure food source; White-throated **Sparrows** for example.

There are perhaps two dozen bird species that visit Northumberland and elsewhere in New County Brunswick for their "winter get-away", that travel from much further north. They can be found in open water just offshore in the Northumberland Straight or Gulf of Saint Lawrence, in open wind-swept fields where the snow accumulation is thin, in our forests and Examples include at our feeders. Barrow's Goldeneye, Snow Buntings, Waxwings, Bohemian Common Redpolls, and American Tree Sparrows.

On occasion a lost bird or vagrant

might find its way to the county by accident during the 3month winter period. This is most likely due to being caught up in a weather system and being blown off course. Over the years there have been visits from Yellow-headed Blackbirds (going to garden feeders), A Barnacle Goose (in the company of migrating Canada Geese), the Eurasian Mistle Thrush (which found a good local source of Mountain Ash berries and protected it for the entire winter) and just this past January a Purple Gallinule, a long way from its Central and South American winter grounds. Although this bird was found alive in Tabusintac and transported quickly to the Atlantic Wildlife Institute outside Sackville, it sadly did not survive due to hypothermia and malnutrition.

Book Review

Sons of a Fisherman by Wayne Curtis

One of my bookshelves is partially filled with Wayne Curtis books, either his novels or his short story collections. They share a shelf with another Miramichier, the late Raymond Fraser. Their books are like old friends as I have met both authors in person over the years since I've moved here. While they are contemporaries, they come from different areas of the Miramichi River basin (Fraser is a "townie", Curtis a rural person), which makes their perspectives unique.

You know what you're getting when you get a new Wayne Curtis short story collection. Sons of a Fisherman has an excellent photo of the author's son Jason guiding his boat on the Cains River. Inside are thirteen stories, some new, some previously published, but all in that nostalgic, contemplative style that we have come to appreciate about Mr. Curtis' writing.


Never more so than in "Autumn Waters" a full-on reminiscence about a time that was from the perspective of a man who writes: "With reluctance I am being pulled toward the dark season, both literally and metaphorically. And I wonder if I will live to see another living spring. It is the time I turn to the past for a bit of comfort." As he stands in the river fishing, he goes on to say:

I yield to emotions that are conceivably felt by artists and sentimentalists and that are ignited by familiar sights and sounds: leaves made crisp by a light frost, the soft voice of the calling river, a blue jay's cry, the brass sounds of locusts and the visions conjured up from those solitary old home fields.

The place is a remedy for my late summer blues.

Beyond the opposite shore, on an alder-infested hillside, our broken-backed old barn stands behind a bower of honeysuckle, its tall doors having blown off in a hurricane.

Opening a Wayne Curtis book is like going on a captivating journey through time. You'll get to travel with Wayne as he fishes, goes to school, dances, falls in love, guides American visitors, and experiences all the different faces of the river. The river is always there, in every season, looking magnificent whether it's during "ice-out" or summertime lows, fast-running or slow and lazy. Wayne's stories are captivating, and you'll feel like you're right there with him. So, if you're in the mood for a heartwarming and exciting read, pick up a Wayne Curtis



book and get ready for an unforgettable adventure!

"You see, I hang on to things. even now, like nobody else I know," he writes in the story "Moving Shadows". We here in New Brunswick and particularly in the Miramichi River watershed, appreciate Wayne Curtis so much. In 2014, he was awarded the Order of New Brunswick, and he is certainly a provincial treasure, if not an unsung national one. At this point in his life, (he will be 81 in February 2024) his stories could be considered memoirs rather than fiction, and it is my wish that he keeps on writing for years to come.

\$25/month for one year. All these donations are tax deductible. In 2023, we had 30 people sign up for this initiative and we are so grateful for their support.

It costs \$675 to run our shelter for one day. We know it is hard to believe, but with the rising cost of everything around us, that's the position the Miramichi SPCA is in. The heartbreaking reality is that without more financial support our doors are at risk of closing every month, leaving hundreds of animals each year with nowhere to go.

Our average monthly operating bills are more than \$20,000 and our "Faithful Friends" will help us to raise 25% of this cost. This initiative, along with our bottle recycling donations, fundraising events, existing donations, and our weekly Kitty Kash draw will help us keep our doors open to care for surrendered animals.

Hundreds of animals come through our doors every year that could have otherwise had terrible fates without our help. Most of these animals receive spay/neuter surgeries, vaccines, a microchip, and flea and worm treatments, on top of daily routine care. They are cared for by experienced staff that have critical knowledge of animal welfare and years of dedication to animal rescue.

We are asking you to consider making this donation of \$25/month to ensure that the shelter is here for years to come and we can continue to save hundreds of abandoned, abused, and neglected animals every year!

Never Give Up


There once was a man from Nantucket who said "Ah, F@#k it."

Kathleen (Sutherland) Quayle aka (Sweet Aunt Kay) turned 93 on Dec. 16, 2023.




My sweet Aunt Kay (aka Kathleen Quayle), who hasn't been well these past few months, is the first to hug me.

MIRAMICHI GROUND SEARCH AND RESCUE

A Snapshot

In this issue of the Giv'er magazine, I will give an overview of MGSAR's implication in the community.

During the last two years, I wrote about the who, what, where, why, and when of Miramichi Ground Search and Rescue. Taken separately, the articles instructive, educational. and informative, but lacked an overview of MGSAR involvement in our community.

What was missing in previous articles is MGSAR dedication to Youth education in safety and survival skills in the woods. A dedicated team of volunteers go to schools, libraries and public events and hold classes aimed at educating our younger generation in three specific areas: Hug a Tree, Survive Outside - for when kids get lost in the woods, and Paddle Smart for water sports safety.

Table 1 shows how many young people participated in the program, note: there were no classes in 2020-2021 due to Covid. More than 1434 youth participated and learned how to survive in the woods translating into 423 volunteer hours. These classes are available to everyone.

Most people take for granted altruistic gestures, in other words what people do for free out of goodwill. It could be someone helping an elderly neighbour, singing in the church choir, or volunteering in search and rescue by giving what is most precious - time. Giving time to MGSAR does not only entail going on a search, but it also includes all the training needed to acquire and maintain skills dedicated to saving lives. Time is not redeemable, once spent you cannot get it back.

Table 2 is a snapshot of how many hours the volunteers at

MGSAR spent on any given year. At first glance, we see there is more demand on the volunteers with the increase in total hours every year except during Covid. During 2023, volunteers were called on 11 searches, had 74 different exercises and participated in 124 different events.

The last column with the **Totals** for the last nine years is an eye opener: 60 life-saving searches, 346 exercises and 829 community and fundraising events. **MGSAR** volunteers spent 67,001 unpaid hours investing in our community.

Unknown to most people, **MGSAR** activated and is deactivated only by law enforcement authorities.

Miramichi Ground Search and Rescue membership is composed exclusively of volunteers, women, and men of all ages. MGSAR is always looking for





New Brunswick residents can expect to receive their 2024 War Amps key tags in the mail starting this week.

Each key tag has a confidentially coded number. If you lose your keys, the finder can call the toll-free number on the back of the tag or place them in any mailbox, and The War Amps will return them to you by courier, free of charge.

The War Amps receives no government grants. With the public's support of the Key Tag Service, the Association is making a difference in the lives of amputees, including children, by providing financial assistance for the cost of artificial limbs, peer support and information on all aspects of living with amputation.
